# Perreault Has Tough Time Tending Goal For Bruins

The man with one of the toughest jobs in sport is nursing his wounds on the rubbing table, an ice pack above his right knee and another on his right foot.

They covered ugly, purple bruises, a trademark of his profession.  
It was Bobby Perreault 31, whose chunky frame is employed from September to April by Boston Bruins of the National Hockey League.

minor hockeyists today is a workout this evening for two Midway squads — Ramblers and Darts. Practice time is at 6 o'clock sharp.

They use it to plug their goal. When it's cut or torn, they have a doctor sew it up. When it's bruised, as it was Dec. 15 at Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens, they nurse it back to health so they can use it again.

Bruins have been the worst team in the NHL for three years and since opposition skaters get more chances to fire away at Boston's goal, Perreault's job is perhaps more hazardous than those of other netminders in the league.

On the night in question, Perreault, a jovial man from Trois-Rivieres, Que., was forced to leave the game in the third period. A hard shot hit the inside of his foot in the second period,

directly on top of an already painful bruise, and shortly after he was accidentally kicked above the knee with a skate. He remained on the ice for a while, then had to retire to the dressing room.

**TOO MANY KIDS**  
His teammates were still on the ice and Perreault winced each time the crowd roared. Toronto finally won it 8-2, scoring its last three goals on Bobby's replacement, Ed Johnston.

He was alone until a reporter dropped in for a chat. The inevitable question was put to Perreault:  
"Can you put your finger on the Bruins' basic problem?"

"Not enough old guys," he replied, flashing his quick smile.  
Then, suddenly serious, he motioned toward the empty benches. "These fellows, they lose, lose, lose. It's like a disease." He pointed to his head.

"But Mill (coach) Mill Schmidt) knows it. He's always telling them to forget about losing last year and the year before."  
Losing comes hard to Perreault who until this year had been a minor leaguer, never with a club that finished last. Despite his harrowing experiences, he's the team comedian. When mates kid him about his weight, he retorts that a little

fat helps cushion the shots or they don't hurt so much.  
"But this is going to hurt tomorrow," he said, still smiling, as he pointed to the welt above the knee.

**JINX RINK**  
Maple Leaf Gardens seems to be a jinx rink for him. He has played there three times this season and has reason to remember each game.  
In the first game Boston defenseman Ted Green accidentally rapped him on the jaw with his stick in a goalmouth skirmish. Perreault had to be x-rayed for a possible fracture. The chin, still sore was nicked on the previous trip, by Louis' Frank Mahovlich. It took 15 stitches.

And on the latest visit he had additional problems with his teammates.  
"Ed Westfall hit me on the chin, right on the cut, when he backed into the net. And Green just about cut my fingers off," Perreault had fallen to the ice and Green was straddling the prostrate goalie while fend-

ing off Toronto players with an upraised stick.  
"I had a funny feeling and pulled my hand out of my glove just in time—Green stepped on it with his skate."  
He was still smiling. "If he ever stops, it's going to be an awfully long season."
