Discusses Vital Problems In Agricultural Industry

The suggestions that the Maritime Provinces and Maine get together to discuss the potato industry, that a killing plant be erected in Charlottetown and that a grain elevator be constructed for the storage of grain were made in the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Mr. Harvey Douglas, Liberal, Second Kings as he spoke on the Draft Address.

Mr. Douglas also suggested that the Government either enforce the law on bringing margarine into the Province or give the people here the privilege of manufacturing the butter substitute. "Margarine is coming here anyway and we may as well produce it and make the money," stated the Second Kings member.

He also defended the work of the Potato Marketing Board although he acknowledged that the Board had tried to run before it could walk. "But we are getting 25 cents a bushel more for our potatoes than we would have received if the Board had not been in existence," he stated.

He pointed out that a stock yard in Charlottetown with its daily sales would bring more money to the producer. "A killing plant would also solve the meat inspection problem here in Charlottetown. The Charlottetown people are demanding that all beef be inspected and that is only right. Such a plant in addition to making a better price for the farmer might also cause less price spread between the producer and consumer."

Margarine Importations Mr. Douglas stated that considerable margarine was being taken into the Province and he thought the Government should see that this practice was stopped or the people given the privilege to go ahead and manufacture margarine here.

"We are importing it and making money for the other Provinces so we may as well make it ourselves. Its 16% milk and we could still sell our milk for this purpose."

"The Potato Marketing Board tried to control prices all over the Maritimes, and they fell down on the undertaking," he stated. "The Board knows it made a mistake as well as anyone and I am not going to condemn them for that. I think it has served a purpose this year. In a poor year we need somebody to intercede for us. We need a representative of the growers to intercede for us and the Board interceded for us at Ottawa last fall so that we were guaranteed an initial payment."

"We are getting about 25 cents a bushel more for our potatoes than we would have received if the Board had not been in existence. Nova Scotia has been squalling about our prices but if they had a Marketing Board in Nova Scotia they could have made the same agreement. New Brunswick did away with their Marketing Board last year but they come over here this year to learn the set-up of our Marketing Board so that they could get in on the potato pool."

"Another thing is that we have all the producers registered. If we wanted to take a plebiscite we would have no trouble finding out who the producers are," he stated.

More Plows Needed

Mr. Douglas stated that Kings County needed more snow plows as they had only 10 out of the 42 in the Province. He said the clearing of snow on the narrow roads was proving quite a problem and he suggested that bulldozers with blades should be used not only to open the side roads but also the country lanes.

Crusade Against Protestantism Urged By Spanish Prelate

BARCELONA, Spain, (AP)—Roman Catholic Archbishop Gregorio Modrego of Barcelona called Monday for a "true crusade" against Protestantism in his diocese. In a pastoral letter, the prelate said such a campaign was necessary because of increased Protestant propaganda and conversion activity.

He asked all parochial leaders to work with Protestants closely and report to the authorities immediately all Protestant actions they considered not to be in conformity with the Spanish bill of rights. This provides non-Catholics must worship in private. No external signs of their religion are permitted.

Continued from page 1 Oysters was practically unlimited and that oysters were a god product in which to expand production. Speaking of draggers he stated that eight boats of the 60 foot class were in operation off Souris and had been fairly successful over the past two years. Four of these draggers were put into operation this year.

Smoke House The Minister noted that smoke houses had been put into operation at Mount Carmel and Egmont Bay. The operations at Mt. Carmel were very successful while the house at Egmont Bay proved to be a failure, he stated. He said there was still room for a great deal of expansion in this particular field.

"There appears to be a good market and room for quite a bit of development of the small fruit and vegetable industry," stated the Minister. "Last year there were 317,000 pounds of strawberries and 382,000 pounds of blueberries taken into the Cold Storage Plant at Charlottetown. The blueberry prices were good and blueberries were a great help to the poor people of the Province. There are many families in the Province whose only income is derived from blueberries," he stated.

"We are carrying on experimental work in blueberry cultivation and have found that we can do as well as either New Brunswick or Maine. In one plot at Tracadie we produced over 3,000 pounds on 3-5 of an acre." He pointed out that after cultivation and care, the area developed into a solid mass of blueberries from which one young College student averaged \$22.00 a day. "He made enough money to take care of his major college expenses for the year," stated the Minister. Other areas are under cultivation at Cape Traverse, Mount Stewart and Ashlon.

Mr. Cullen stated that he thought there was a great possibility for the development of the strawberry crop. "I feel that when we have the Economic Development Council close study will show us the best lines for future development," he stated.

Community Rally Planned

"Many citizens of Murray Harbor and surrounding districts are looking forward to the Community Rally which gets underway Thursday afternoon and continues through Friday night. Assisting in the afternoon discussions and addressing the night sessions will be Mr. Reid Sangster, fishery fieldman and Mr. Alex McIsaac, secretary of the Co-op. Union, both of Nova Scotia.

Co-op. leaders in the Murray Harbor area have been urged to organize these meetings and give the people of the community an opportunity to revive the old spirit of the hungry thirties, when much good was done by short courses, discussion groups, etc. Many rumors have been floating about of late that Murray Harbor is considering some further Co-op. development. Perhaps this rally will bring out some worthwhile discussion on how the common people can build a better community when united effort is employed to solve its problems.

Feature of the get-together will be the attendance of the women folk who will be given an opportunity to discuss their role in community growth. In N.S. some success is already apparent in communities where the women have shouldered some of the responsibility. Mr. McIsaac will have something to offer on that subject.

Economic Development

"The Economic Development Council is principally designed to find ways of means of giving our people year-round employment," he stated. One little industry that would employ ten people indefinitely is worth more than a million or multi-dollar building. For example the dragger industry at Souris, established by Premier Jones is worth five times more than any of the big buildings we have. "Today our position for the development of industries is much better than at any time in the past. We have fairly adequate transportation although we desperately need another modern boat at Borden. It is quite possible that we

may develop industries on the materials we produce here." In his opening remarks the Minister paid a fine tribute to Senator Jones. "He was Premier for ten years and his record for length of service equals that established by

the late W. W. Sullivan. He was elected three times as Premier which is a new record. "Senator Jones was never defeated in Provincial politics and retired as undefeated champion. I wish for him a long future to enjoy

the leisure of semi-retirement in the Senate." Mr. Cullen also extended his congratulations to the Speaker, Hon. Forrest Phillips, the mover and second of the reply to the Speech from the Throne.
