WAR NEWS.

Special Dispatch to Examiner.

LONDON, Feb. 23

There is a marked contrast between the opinions on the situation at Vienna expressed by various correspondents.

The Manchester Guardian's special says that war with Russia is not believed possible, and the opinion prevails that the mobilization decreed will be for the purpose of occupying Bosnia and Herzegovina, as Russia desired.

The Times correspondent says the peace at any-price agitators cannot prevent the Government from carrying credit through the Delegations and Reichstrath; but if they should succeed in baulking the Government's policy, the Government will resign.

The Telegraph's correspondent says the Delegations will vote the credit, but the Bill for raising money would inevitably fail in the Reichstrath, so that Andrassy is not likely to attempt to carry it. He will satisfy himself with a vote of confidence from the Delegations.

There is not much probability that Austria will do more than protest against the terms of peace whatever their character may be.

The Times leading editorial article says the struggle is between Andrassy's policy of maintenance of Austrian interests as heretofore declared, and the temptation offered by Russia to counterbalance the interest.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 23.

The Agence Russe says: "The conditions of peace published in London are incorrect. Russia has never demanded the expulsion of the Mussulmen inhabitants of Bulgaria. She has only demanded the recall of Turkish officials and troops. Russia dare not hand over a portion of Bosnia Servia.

The question of boundary is reserved for the consideration of Europe. The publisher's version contains other gross inaccuracies.

LONDON, Feb. 28.

The Channel Squadron has reached Malta.

The Standard, in another article discussing the landing places of British forces in the Sea of Marmora, thinks Besika Bay the most probable place.

The morning papers repeat yesterday's announcement of the appointment of Lord Napier and General Wolsley.

The Post says the brigade of guards has been raised to its war strength. There is great activity in the brigade which is completing arrangements for active service. All manufacturing centres report great activity.

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.

The Dominion Rifle Association met today. The Annual Report shows the team for 1878 has been selected as follows: One from Ontario, five from Quebec, twelve from New Brunswick, and two from Nova Scotia. This is a great triumph for New Brunswick.

A Bill was introduced making Life Insurance policies unforfeitable.

Replying to Mr. Ross as to whether the Government considered the Bay Chaleur railway a feeder of the Intercolonial Railway and intended aiding it, the Premier said he did not know where it began or ended, and had no intentions respecting it.

Replying to Mr. Mitchell, the Premier said the Miramichi railway might, or might not, be an important feeder of the Intercolonial.

The Government had no old rails, and an intention to dispose of them—if any such were entertained—would be of little use.

Mr. Mitchell: then we may have some little hope! The Premier said that where old rails had been granted, if the conditions of the grants were not complied with, and there were rails on hand, the question of their disposal would come up.

Mr. Kirkpatrick, in moving for the Pacific Railway Survey between Red River and Battleford, said that two or three hundred miles of the location was a swamp, below the level of Lake Manitoba, where bottom could not be found with a ten-foot pole.

The Flood at Port Hope, Ont.

PORT HOPE, Feb. 23.—The most extensive flood ever known has taken place here to-day, resulting in the destruction of thousands of dollars' worth of property, and in the drowning of two children. Part of the track of the Midland railway is washed away. The railway bridge over Smith's creek is gone, and three or four other bridges, the property of the town. The barns of one of the hotels, and several dwelling houses, have been destroyed. The flood has not yet abated. The greatest excitement prevails. Hundreds were on the street witnessing the grand sight. The express office and old post office were three or four feet under water. Several store windows were broken by the ice. Hundreds of tons of it are blocking up the streets.

Revolution Raging all Over the Republic.

SAN DOMINGO, Feb. 7.—A revolution has been raging all over the Republic since Feb. 3rd. San Domingo City has been surrounded by revolutionists under Generals Guilermo and Billeni. President Liaz intends to stand a siege, and artillery is being placed in the forts surrounding the city. Diaz will be unable to resist much longer, on account of the distressed state of the country. The prisons are overcrowded, provisions very scarce, prices daily advancing, and commerce in a deplorable condition throughout the Republic. Very few merchants will be able to meet their engagements. No particulars have been received about fighting in the Northern Provinces, as all communication is interrupted.

Two of the oldest business firms in Ottawa have become bankrupt.

At present there is no ice visible in the straits outside St. Peter's Island.

IN Montreal, on the 25th, a young man named Wm. Stafford attempted suicide by shooting. Disappointed love was the cause.

THERE was a great ice shove at Belleville, Ont., on Saturday. Buildings and bridges were carried away and considerable damage is reported.

THE report on the adulteration of food, just presented to the Dominion Parliament, shows that one-half of all samples examined were adulterated.

THE Catholic clergy of Toronto advise their people to ignore O'Donovan Rossa, on his visit to that city, and have nothing to do with him. The heads of the Orange body declare that the Provincial authorities should take steps to prevent his lecturing.

A DESPATCH from Fredericton, N. B., says: "Rev. Mr. Carr, rector of Kingsclear, died this morning at nine o'clock. This whole community mourn the loss of this truly Christian minister. He leaves a widow and three children.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning, Pius McEachern, for an assault and battery on Daniel Marshall, was fined \$2 or 8 days; J. Carver, drunk and on complaint of his wife, was fined \$3 or 14 days; James F. Montgomery, arraigned by summons for furious driving, was discharged. The case of M. P. Rotchford, for extorting money from Mr. William Lochhead, was postponed until to-morrow.

THE AQUATIC CHAMPIONSHIP.—We learn by a Reuter's telegram from Sydney, New South Wales, that Edward Trickett, the Australian champion, has announced that he declines to row matches anywhere except upon Australian waters. This is, no doubt very disappointing news to Higgins, Courtney and Haulan, all of whom might have been accommodated with matches if Trickett had consented—as it was alleged he had done—to row on some river or lake in the United States. Our Australian telegram further states that a match between Trickett and Courtney (the American champion) is still likely to be arranged, but we must be permitted, under the circumstances, to doubt the probabilities of such a match being brought to an issue at the present time.—Newcastle Chronicle, Feb. 8.

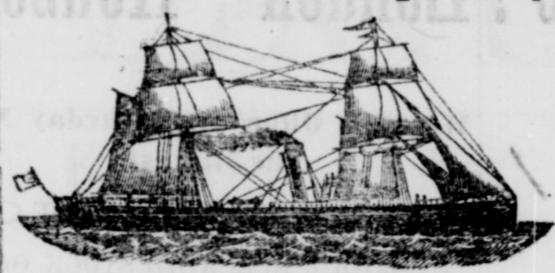
