Magistrate's Court Held At Georgetown
Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, held his weekly court in the Court House at Georgetown yesterday afternoon. Two residents of Point Pleasant, charged jointly under the Excise Act with having two stills in their possession, had their case adjourned until Friday, Sept. 29, for judgment. The case had been heard at Montague on Monday, Sept. 18. A Montague resident pleaded guilty to operating a motor vehicle at a speed greater than 20 miles per hour contrary to a Town of Montague by-law and was fined \$10 and \$3 costs or ten days in jail. Two residents of Peter's Road were charged under a Town of Montague by-law with causing a disturbance by blowing on his behalf. Each pleaded guilty and was fined \$3 with joint costs of \$3, or ten days in jail. A Brudenell resident pleaded guilty to operating a motor vehicle in excess of 20 miles per hour contrary to a Town of Montague by-law and was fined \$10 with \$3 costs, or ten days in jail. A resident of Peter's Road, charged with being intoxicated in a public place contrary to the Prince Edward Island Temperance Act, pleaded guilty and was fined \$20, with \$3.70 costs, or 30 days in jail. Court was adjourned until Friday, Sept. 29, at 2:30 at Georgetown.
