### Largest Brick Building.

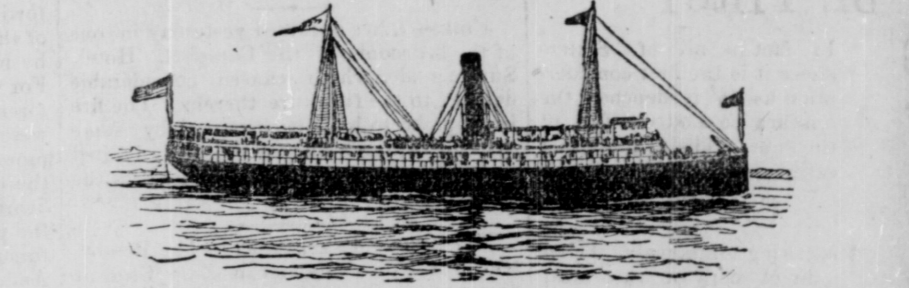

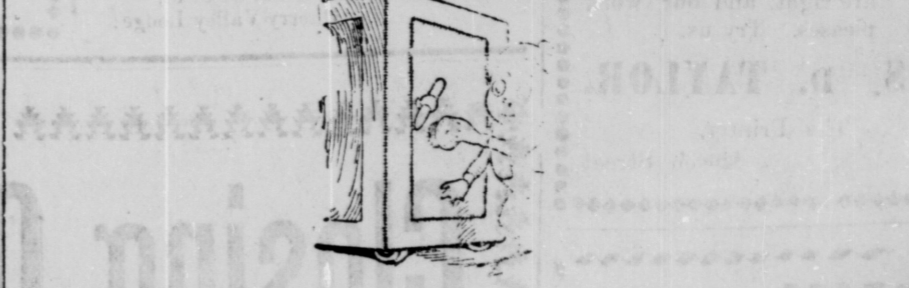
