Edmontons John Ducey Founds Oldtimers Club

EDMONTON (CP) — In 1920 John Ducey was a batboy for visiting teams that played against Edmonton clubs in the old Western Canada Baseball League.
He never made it as a player but he developed a passion for the game that, in later years, made him a driving force in efforts to keep professional baseball alive on the Prairies.
When that failed, Ducey was determined to see that at least some aspect of the old days would be preserved.
Now a 56-year-old insurance agent, he has maintained his close personal relationship with many of the former players, officials and fans of the early era.
This liaison made him a natural catalyst in the formation of the Edmonton Oldtimers Baseball Association and he used his knowledge and friendship to trace many of those who have been associated with the game in Edmonton since 1904. Among them were more than 20 who went on to play in the major leagues.
Today the association has 119 members, all over 50 and all with some direct association with Edmonton clubs of the past. The latest to join is Henry Emmett (Heine) Manush, now retired and living in Sarasota, Fla.
Manush, a member of baseball's Hall of Fame, played 16 years in the majors on six clubs and compiled a lifetime batting average of .330. He was an outfielder with the 1921 Edmonton Eskimos.
Others who previously joined the association include: Floyd (Babe) Herman, long-time star with the old Brooklyn Dodgers; John Edward (Beans) Reardon, a National League umpire for 24 years; Gordon (Deacon) Jones, one-time New York Yankees southpaw and now a Yankees scout; John S. Phillips, head of Howe News Service, Chicago, and official American League statistician; Clarence Campbell, a one-time catcher in Edmonton and now National Hockey League president; and Leroy Goldworthy, who later gained fame as an NHL player and now a golf professional.
Ducey, a walking encyclopedia of Edmonton baseball history, recalled events that brought Manush to Edmonton in 1921.
"Fred Snodgrass, the great (New York) Giants outfielder, was a personal friend of Gus Gleichman, playing manager of the 1921 Edmonton Eskimos. Gleichman was a first baseman, but so were Manush and Babe Herman, who also was invited to Eskimos' spring camp.
"Gleichman broke his leg, but decided to keep only one other first baseman. He chose Herman. Snodgrass talked to him for four hours and convinced him that Manush could stick as an outfielder."
Both joined the club and had great years, Manush hitting 321 despite a leg injury that kept him out of 24 games, and Herman .333. At the end of the year they were sold to Detroit Tigers.
In his major league career Manush twice hit .378, the first time with the 1926 Detroit Tigers when he won the American League batting title. Manush, Ty Cobb and Harry Hielmann formed one of the greatest outfield units in Detroit history.
Manush also gained fame as the first player ever ejected from a world series game. Umpire Charlie Moran ordered him out during the 1933 series between Washington Senators and New York Giants. Moran had called Manush out on a close play at first and in the ensuing argument Manush ended up with Moran's tie and a niche in series history.

Meadow Count Derby Entry

DUBLIN (CP) Reuters — Thirty-six final acceptors, including Canadian-owned Meadow Court, were named Thursday for the Irish Sweepstakes Derby at the Curragh June 26.
Meadow Court, owned by Calgary publisher Max Bell, was second in the Epsom Derby behind Sea Bird.
Other final acceptors include Reliance, winner of the French Derby, and Niksar, the English 2,000 guineas winner.
The sweepstakes for the Irish Derby will carry a record 79,210 pounds (\$237,630) in prize money. Purse for the winner of the 1 1/2-mile classic will be 55,650 pounds (\$166,950).

Chess Finished

CHRISTCHURCH, N.Z. (Reuters) — A two-year-chess match by mail between New Zealand and Canadian correspondence chess associations has been won by New Zealand.
Play began July 1, 1962, and finished Sept. 30, 1964, but agreement and adjudication on unfinished games took several months to complete.

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George Chuvalo Underestimated

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — Former world feather-weight champion Willie Pep says some people underestimate the ability of Canadian heavyweight champion George Chuvalo of Toronto.
"Chuvalo is the toughest heavyweight in the world today," Pep said here this week. "He can hit and he can take a punch." Pep was the referee Monday night when Chuvalo scored a first-round technical knockout over Sonny Andrew Burns of Boston. Chuvalo ended the one-sided non-title bout at 2:33.
Chuvalo, ranked no. 3 by the world boxing association, is in line for a crack at champion Cassius Clay. A group of Toronto sportsmen has offered Clay \$750,000 to meet Chuvalo in Toronto for the title Sept. 5. The Chuvalo camp expects to learn today (Thursday) whether Clay's handlers will accept the offer, according to Chuvalo's manager Irv Ungerman, a Toronto businessman.
"Clay has fought some good boys," Pep said. "But nobody actually knows how good Clay is." Pep says that Chuvalo will probably beat Clay if they ever meet for the title.
"Clay is very fast but Chuvalo is a dedicated fighter, who can take everything Clay has to offer."
Pep was at Lewiston, Me. and watched Clay knock out challenger Sonny Liston in the first round.
"Liston was knocked out," he said. "He just didn't have it." Pep called Liston "an old man" with his age in the vicinity of 42 or 43. "Liston has a daughter 26 — so figure it for yourself."
Pep blamed Clay for the mix-up that led to referee Jersey Joe Walcott's confusion over the count. "Clay refused to go to a

neutral corner. The count shouldn't have started until he did. Walcott should have told the timer to stop the count until he got Clay to the corner."
Pep, who says he has officiated in several fights, said Clay is hard to handle in the ring because he gets too excited.
Pep, who denied reports that he has retired, said the heavyweight division has all the glamour today "but the middle-weight class is the best." He said fighters like Dick Tiger, Joe Archer and champion Joey Giardello are "great fighters."
What's ahead for Willie Pep? "I plan to move to Niagara Falls, N.Y., and then resume fighting," Pep retired in the early 1950s, but started a comeback this year and won four fights. He said he injured his hip in training earlier this month, "then the report came out that I retired."

Chualo's Fight Is Cancelled

The Cape Breton Boxing Commission said Thursday they did not consider Bailey a worthy opponent for Chuvalo who is third-ranked heavyweight in the world.
Promoter Gus MacLellan said he was seeking a world ranking opponent for Chuvalo in Glace Bay at a later date.
