Before the conclusion of the meeting, a penny auction was held by Marjorie Clary. The prize being won by David McCarron. The meeting adjourned in the usual manner.

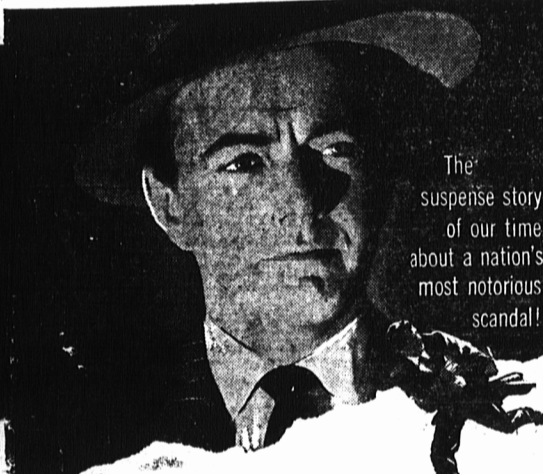

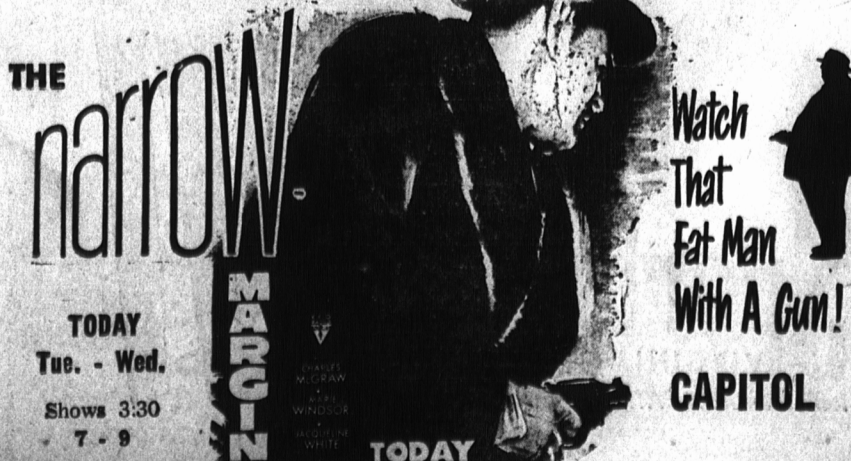

Continued from page 1 this province towards which a step already has been taken in the planning for immediate erection of additional facilities for housing prisoners.

The Sun story said that because of lack of prison staff, prisoners have virtual control of some sections of the institution. It added that they occasionally beat a prisoner who does not obey the order of the prison crime bosses, and that guards often are powerless to stop such happenings.

The Sun article said men and women go into Oakalla and come out better schooled in crime than when they entered. Oakalla has 800 prisoners, most of them housed two to a cell. Prisoners the newspaper men found virtually control the laundry and the tailor shop and until recently had the controlling hand in the kitchen and hospital.

There is illicit trading within the prison. It revolves around the kitchen stoves, Larsen reported. "Inmates in the kitchen need clean clothes but, if they don't supply their own, tobacco, etc., to the prisoner-controlled laundry, their clothes come back in tatters," Larsen wrote. "The tailor shop holds its weight through distribution of new clothes." Larsen was told that aged prostitutes in the women's jail prey on young girls. He said they recruit girls of 15 or 16 to work for them in Vancouver when they are released from the prison.
