PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Tarte and the Temperance Men

LAURIER'S LAPSE OF MEMORY.

Blair and Intercolonial Extension.

OTTAWA, May 15.—The whole of yesterday afternoon and part of the evening was spent in discussing the case of the Rev. Mr. Fairley, head of the Industrial Indian School at Winnipeg, who, it will be remembered, refused to let Hon. Mr. Tarte and his companions lunch within the walls of the schoolhouse if they brought liquor in. Hon. Mr. Sifton promised to investigate the case.

After the statement made by Hon. Mr. Laurier that the Government had not yet determined in what form and manner the plebiscite vote would be taken it was something of a surprise when Hon. Mr. Mowatt, replying to Sir McKenzie Bowell in the Senate yesterday, stated that the plebiscite bill would be introduced in a few days, and was now in the hands of the clerk to be perfected. It is understood that Hon. Mr. Blair has completed his negotiations with the Grand Trunk Company for the Intercolonial Railway extension into Montreal.

MORE COMPLICATIONS.

A Macedonian Rising.

The Powers and the Porte.

LONDON, May 15.—A despatch to the Chronicle from Athens says that the Greeks who have arrived there from Dania report a Macedonian rising in the district between Selze and Kezanna, while the Times, Athens evening paper, states that there has been a rising in Central Macedonia; that 4000 insurgents have captured a pass forming a part of the principal line of communication of the Turkish army; that they are advancing towards Elasona and are preparing to unite their forces with bands under Davella, Serneas and other Macedonian chiefs.

PARIS, May 15.—It is believed here that there is no doubt that Germany is urging moderation upon the Sultan.

The Powers, it is since officially intimated, do not intend to press Greece to surrender her fleet as the payment of the war indemnity which Turkey will probably demand. Greece, in this respect, it is added, will be allowed full liberty.

IMPORTANT BANK CHANGES.

Rumored Retirement of Mr. Hague and Promotion of Mr. Fyshe.

MONTREAL, May 15.—It is stated in this city that George Hague, general manager of the Merchants' Bank of Canada, is to retire from the control of the Bank.

The rumor also is that the position to be thus vacated has been offered to Thomas Fyshe, cashier of the Bank of Nova Scotia, and that he has intimated his intention of accepting it.

AN ABLE MAN ELECTED.

Hon. John S. Hall in the Quebec Legislature.

MONTREAL, May 15.—Fortier's cigar and cigarette factory has closed down. It employed 150 hands.

The returning officer has declared Hon. John S. Hall (Conservative) elected in St. Antoine Division of this city by sixteen of a majority. The first statement was that the Division had elected Mr. Bickerdike (Liberal) by five of a majority.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

MONTREAL, May 14.—J. M. Fortier & Co., manufacturers of cigars and cigarettes, employing 150 hands, have shut down their factory.

LONDON, May 14.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Bombay says that the bubonic plague is making fearful ravages in the Cutchmandvi district, where there have been 2,090 deaths in a fortnight. Half the population has fled.

MONTREAL, May 13.—The tea market was more excited than for a long time. Enquiries from New York and Chicago were heavy and urgent, but there is a scarcity of the grades wanted. Japans are worth less than 16c.

NEW YORK, May 13.—At to-day's session of the Ancient Order of Hibernians Board of Erin a committee was appointed to meet with a similar committee of the Board of America, with full power to act finally and decisively on the question of both orders in this country.

MONTREAL, May 13.—Although it does not matter much how many documents come over from Rome on the school question, it will be interesting to know as a matter of news that the Pope through the propaganda has sent an official letter to the Canadian bishops informing them that the Manitoba school settlement is unsatisfactory to the Catholic conscience.

QUEBEC, May 13.—Hon. Felix Marchand's troubles have only just begun. Rumor credits the premier elect with a desire to exclude all those who had anything to do with the scandals of the Mercier regime from the new cabinet. But this would seem impossible, for the reason that the Mercierites number nineteen in the house and could down Marchand at any moment.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—The movement to secure the adoption of a universal postage stamp by the postal congress has collapsed. There were too many difficulties in the way of adopting such a stamp, and the general committee, after considering the subject briefly, abandoned it as impracticable, and will make an adverse report to the congress. Although the proportion that each country transports free of charge through mails has not yet come before the congress, it seems practically certain that it will be defeated.

LONDON, May 14.—In the house of Commons yesterday the bill to prevent the importation of goods manufactured in foreign prisons passed the second reading.

PARIS, May 14.—The amount of damage done by frost to vineyards in the department of Yonne is estimated at 20,000,000 francs (\$4,000,000). The inhabitants are in a state of consternation.
