Salt Water Baths.

For a hand bath (a bath given to the body by use of the hands only or by sponge or cloth) place a handful of salt in a basin as ordinarily filled for washing. Allow the salt to dissolve or hasten the action by stirring it with the hand. The water should be as cold as you have vitality to withstand. Use no soap. Bath the entire body. Do not neglect the face and neck in the free use of the salt water.

This bath has an exhilarating influence, tones the entire system and gives to the skin a healthful condition that amply repays for the time and trouble involved. If used in the winter, it will be an excellent preventive of colds, besides being a substitute for face cosmetics. No chapping, no roughness of the skin and no clogging of the pores will trouble the person who systematically and regularly takes a bath of this sort.

Ordinary table salt or rock salt will do, but will not do so well. The sea salt contains medicinal properties not found in the others. Whether one exercises or not the body should receive a daily hand bath of cold or cool water, especially in the summer, either upon rising or before retiring.—Edward B. Warman in Ladies' Home Journal.

PRICES OF PROVISIONS

Liverpool Steady - Chicago Declines

Montreal Trade Fair.

The Montreal Gazette reports the demand for all lines of provisions as fair on Monday, and a moderate active jobbing trade doing at steady prices. It quotes: Canadian short cut mess pork \$15.50 short cut back \$15, and heavy long cut mess, \$15.00 per barrel; pure Canadian lard in pairs, 7 1/2 to 7 3/4 per lb.; and compound refined at 6c to 6 1/2 per lb. Hams, 11c to 12 1/2c, and bacon, 11c to 12 1/2c per lb.

In Chicago, pork declined 5c to 7 1/2c, closing \$8.12 1/2, November, \$8.12 1/2 December, \$9.55 January, \$9.65.

The only change in the Liverpool provision market was a decline of 3d in Australian tallow. Prime western pork, 57s 6d; prime western lard, 27s 6d.

BUTTER, CHEESE AND EGGS

Butter Firm, Cheese Dull and Heavy

—Eggs Well up.

In Montreal, according to the Star, the butter market was firm on Tuesday and holders were asking rather more than on the previous day, one merchant declining less than 20c for his creameries. The quotation range from 19 to 20c.

The cheese market on the same day was reported dull and steady. Quebec Octobers were quoted at 10 1/2. The public cable was 54s 6d to 66s.

Cold storage eggs ranged from 13 1/2 to 17 cents, according to quality. Other quotations were: culls, 11 to 13c; No. 2 14 to 16c; straight gathered, 16 to 17 1/2; No. 2 limed, 12 to 13 1/2; No. 1 limed 15 to 16 1/2c straight candled, 17 to 18 1/2c. selects, 20 to 23c, in small lots.

CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.

There is a good deal of produce being shipped from various parts of the province. Potatoes and oats are moving more freely than they were last week. The street price of oats is 23c, and for potatoes the buyers are offering 16c.

The highest price buyers are offering for cheese is 10 1/2c, and it is said that there are not more than 1200 unsold at the present time. Since Friday last Dillon & Spillett bought 450 boxes, for the most of which they paid a sixteenth of a cent in advance of the Brockville price.

Eggs bring 15c, with very few coming in.

At the pork factory they are offering 4 1/2c for hogs over 275, while for those ranging from 175 to 200 4c is the figure. For hogs under 175 the price is 3 1/2c.

The price of dressed pork ranges from 5 to 5 1/2c.
