Livestock Industry Has Key To Alberta Economic Health

EDMONTON CP.—Oil sales may be more spectacular but Alberta's livestock industry last year is thought by many to hold the key to the province's long-term economic health.

Dr. C. F. Bentley, dean of agriculture at the University of Alberta predicted recently the Prairie livestock industry would double in the next 20 years. It brought 20 per cent more revenue to Alberta farmers last year than in 1964.

Dr. Bentley told an economic conference that although only a fifth of Alberta's labor force is engaged in primary agriculture production more than half its 1,400,000 citizens are directly or indirectly dependent on agriculture for their jobs. This includes the handling processing

servicing and distribution of agricultural products and supplying the needs of farm people.

HIGHEST IN YEARS
Alberta farm cash income for 1965 is estimated at \$632,000,000 the highest in seven years.

But "meat not wheat will be the base of Western agriculture in future" A. B. Hill president of Burns Foods Ltd. forecast recently.

Alberta sells more livestock than the other Western provinces combined and supplies about a quarter of all Canadian

exports of hogs and beef cattle. Horses and sheep are on the wane on Alberta farms but the cattle population rose to 3,200,000 head last year from 1,500,000 head in 1951.

Increasing beef herds more than make up for a slight decline in dairy cattle, which accounts for about eight per cent of the total.

Arrival of more than 40 Charolais cattle from France later this year, the first imports of purebred Charolais for almost 40

years, may give the cattle industry another spurt.

And good prices are encouraging farmers to stay in, or get in, the livestock field, while many are still wary of the long-term stability of the grain market.

HOG PRICES RISE
Thanks largely to a decrease in United States production last year, hog prices reached record levels on the Alberta livestock market last month.

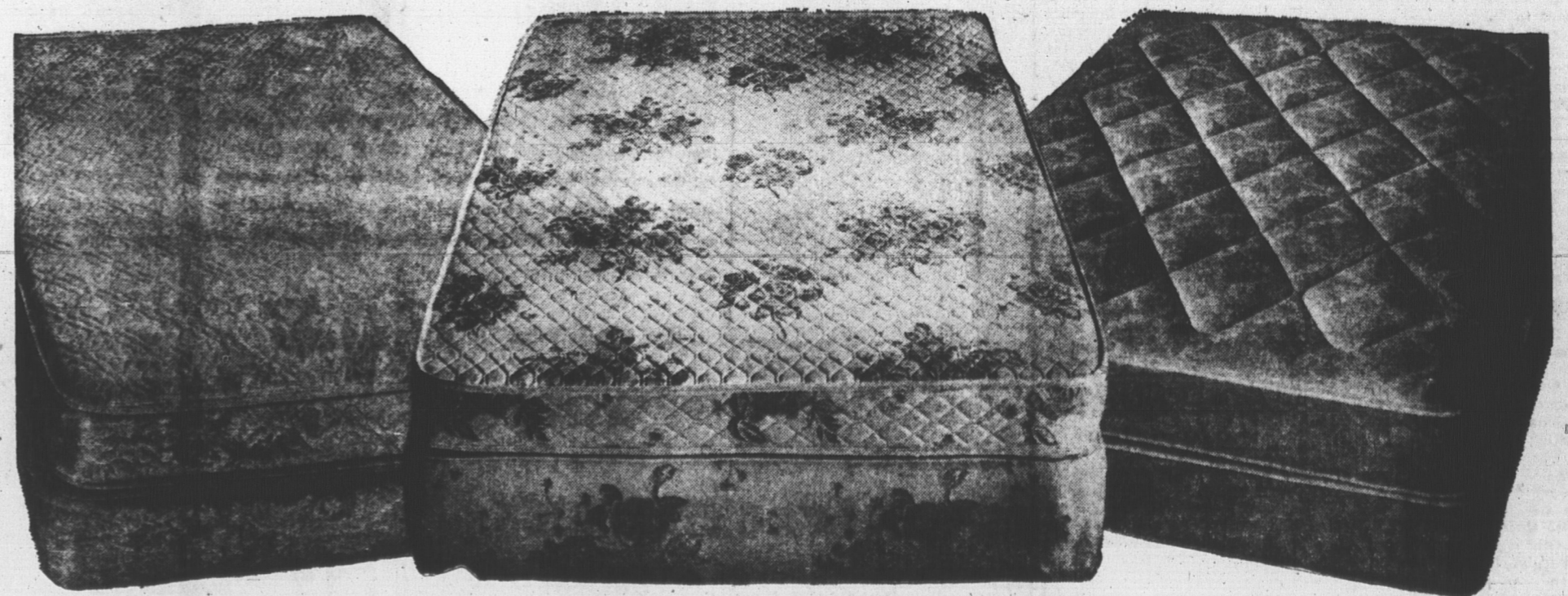
