Striking And Divergent Views Outlined To Managing Editors

Some widely divergent views to those held by many newspapermen were expressed by Ian Campbell, director of the department of extension, Mount Allison University, at the annual Managing Editors Conference at the Charlottetown, Saturday afternoon.

Sitting he had been requested to offer criticism of the press. Professor Campbell said he disagreed with the position taken by papers that they should provide neutral reports on the news. He urged them to take a public approach despite the possibility they would be criticised by the newspaper industry.

He felt the public wanted and needed intelligent day-to-day comment on news and in their home city and in the national field. While the public was aware of issues involved, it had no understanding of the ideas underlying government in Canada and believed most provincial papers were not providing sufficient detail regarding national and international news.

While he agreed geography prevented existence of a national paper, in the sense The Canadian Times and the Montreal Guardian are so regarded in England, he also admitted each local paper was under an obligation to the people of its own area.

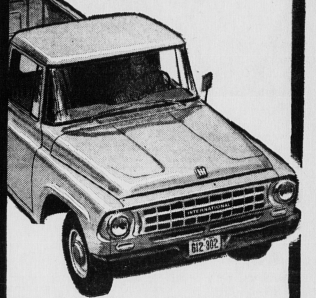

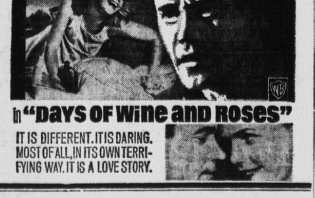
