

Red's Bid To Canada Awaits PM's Decision

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Diefenbaker is expected to announce early next week whether Soviet Premier Khrushchev will visit Canada in September.

External Affairs Minister Green said Thursday the question of inviting the Soviet premier to Canada was discussed at 90-minute morning cabinet meeting, but that no decision would be announced until at least Monday.

Any decision would have to await the return next weekend of Mr. Diefenbaker from a vacation in Prince Albert, Sask.

No decision will be made until Monday at the earliest," he said.

LEAVES FOR HOLIDAY

Mr. Green left Ottawa by air at noon for a vacation in Western Canada. He planned to speak to Mr. Diefenbaker from Calgary Thursday night about cabinet business, including the possibility of a Khrushchev visit.

The Soviet leader is scheduled to visit the U.S. about Sept. 15. Mr. Green said he did not think that any visit by the Russian premier would include points other than Ottawa.

Hoffa Berated On Behaviour

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate racketeering committee said Tuesday "it would be hard to find a labor leader who has so shamelessly abused his members or his trust" as president James R. Hoffa of the Teamsters Union.

Unless steps are taken to curb his power, the eight-man committee said in a unanimous report, Hoffa will "destroy the decent labor movement in the United States."

Meanwhile, Justice Felix Frankfurter of the U.S. Supreme Court refused to stay the effectiveness of a decree upholding broad powers of a board of monitors set up by a federal district court to police Hoffa's presidency of the union.

The union had sought to overturn the monitors' cleanup program. The U.S. Court of Appeals here rejected the union move.

The union then appealed to Frankfurter for a stay pending final supreme court action on an appeal to be filed later.

committee dealt with hearings held last year. The group said in a summary:

"Ignominy was piled on ignominy as the testimony arose through stories of violence, financial manipulations, callous repression of democratic rights and racketeer control."

The committee, headed by Senator John L. McClellan (Dem. Ark.), challenged Hoffa's contention that he consistently got better working conditions and higher wages for his members than other unions do.

"Nothing could be further from the truth," the report said.

"Time and again the committee has found Hoffa to be faithless to the members of his own union. He has betrayed their members so frequently that it has become abundantly clear that Hoffa's chief interest is his own advancement and that of his friends and cronies — a great number of whom are racketeers."

The committee has been looking into affairs of the 1,500,000-member union during the last three years. Its hearings contributed largely to the resignation of Hoffa's predecessor, Dave Beck.

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
