## Paul Jay Hurls No-Hitter As Dodgers Dump Stars 8-1

Paul Jay, strongarm righthander of Charlie Ryan's Dodgers, tossed an eight-inning, no-hitter at the Stars at Memorial Field last night and his mates scored 8 runs behind him for an 8-1 victory.

Jay was absolutely untouchable and the Stars didn't even get a ball out of the infield in the entire game. During the eight innings he faced 26 batters, one getting on by an error and the other three on walks.

The lone run was scored when Bill Purcell walked in the fifth and came all the way after the catcher's throw to second attempting to cut him down on a steal sailed far and away into center-field.

The Dodgers scored a pair of runs in the first and made the scoreboard read 5-0 when Buck Whitlock unloaded the first circuit clout of the year in the third with two men aboard. The winners added another in the fourth and pitcher Jay helped his own cause by clubbing a double in the seventh with the sacks loaded to chase across another pair of runs.

Whitlock got a single with his homer for a 2 for 3 night and Jay MacKinnon had two one base blows in three trips. Ken Macdonald and Forbie Kennedy got the other Dodger hits.

# Cleveland And Boston Win Yesterday's Games; Tribe In Virtual Tie For Lead

Cleveland Indians climbed into a virtual tie with Chicago White Sox for first place in the American League Thursday when Vic Wertz hammered a three-run homer to give the Redskins a 6-3 victory over the Yankees at New York.

Only two games separated fourth-place Boston and the leading White Sox after some slugging by Jackie Jensen and Jimmy Piersall provided a 7-3 Red Sox triumph over Chicago.

The Chicago defeat sliced the White Sox' league lead to only two percentage points over Cleveland, and dropped the Yankees into third place, a game behind the pace-setters.

Washington bats rang out for 15 hits and the Senators slowed down Detroit "Tigers" pennant hopes 9-6. And former Yankee Ed Lopat made his Baltimore debut, beating Kansas Athletics 8-1 in an 8-hitter.

Ernie Banks walloped his 34th, 35th and 36th homers at Chicago and the Cubs edged Pittsburgh 11-1 in another adding machine affair. Banks also had a single in five trips and accounted for seven runs.

At Milwaukee the Braves blew a 9-6 lead in the top of the ninth inning to Brooklyn Dodgers, who poured five tallies across the plate and won out in an 11-0 slugfest.

The big blow of the Dodger rally was Roy Campanella's three run homer, his 24th. There were six homers in the game. Don Zimmerman and Carl Furillo also getting round trippers for the Dodgers, while Bobby Thomson, Johnny Logan and Andy Patko countered for Milwaukee.

The victory boosted the Dodgers 15½ games in front of the second-place Braves for their largest lead in the National League season.

Bob Thurman's eighth-inning single scored Wally Pate from second base at Cincinnati and the Redlegs took a 4-3 decision from Philadelphia Phillies. It was the eighth Cincinnati victory in their last nine games.

Wertz smashed his 13th homer in the seventh off Johnny Kucks with the score 2-2 after a single by Gene Woodling and a walk to Al Rosen, who had four singles in four trips for the afternoon. Mickey Mantle hit his 24th homer in the ninth inning when a Yankee rally fizzled out. The Yankees, who led the league by 6½ games July 2, have lost 19 of their last 30 games.

Jensen and Piersall drove in six runs.

Red Sox runs, and Ellis Kinder came on in relief at Boston to retire the last five batters and preserve Willard Nixon's 11th victory.

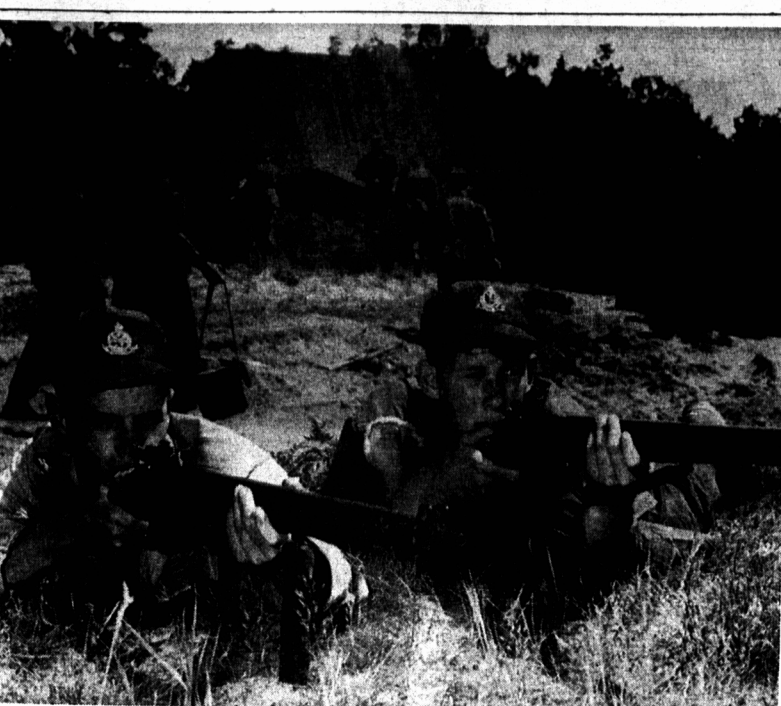

In winning the Hambletonian classic Little Joe, as he is known south of the border accomplished what every driver in the harness racing world dreams about doing.

At least the Canadian Press reports had Joe's birthplace right which is more than can be said for a certain Halifax sports announcer who listed Joe as a "born and bred Nova Scotian" while none of us Islanders mind sharing a bit of the glory with those "Blue Noses" across the strait we would like it understood that Joe was born in Alberton, P.E.I. in 1917 and although he did a bit of racing and lived a few years in Nova Scotia his attachments to the rich, red earth of P.E.I. is indisputable.

Little Joe proved beyond a doubt that he is one of the finest drivers in the business although that's one fact that didn't take too much proving. When he was driving on Maritime tracks, the "bush tracks" referred to by the Time magazine sports writer in his article on Joe—the little fellow was so good that fans got into the habit of looking for his name on the scorecard and, without a glance at the name of the horse's handle, made their way to the pari-mutuel windows to bet a dollar or two, confident that Joe would bring Glue Works in at least a fighting third.

Joe's ride to Nova Scotia in a coal car is now almost as famous as the one made by a young Bostonian by the name of Paul Revere when he raced through the countryside warning all good Americans that the English were coming. Whether or not Joe did take a lift with a load of anthracite at this stage of the game is completely immaterial and irrelevant. It lends a colorful note to his Horatio Alger "rags to riches" story and whether he wants to or not he is stuck with it for the rest of his remaining days. He is a famous name now, and famous names thrive on legends.
