THREATS TO THE CANBY SQUAD.—The New York Sun says: The Presbyterian Church in the United States can very easily raise the extra \$1,000,000 needed for church purposes. We suppose there are many wealthy men in the Presbyterian communion than in any other religious communion in the country; and that in proportion to its membership, the Presbyterian body is the richest of all church bodies, richer even in the aggregate than the Episcopal body. Outside of it, there are doubtless a number of individuals much richer than any of its members, perhaps about a dozen, all told. There are thousands of millions in the hands of Presbyterians.

DISCOVERY ACCIDENT.—News of a sad discovery accident at Stanhope yesterday reached town today. About 3 o'clock in the afternoon Theodore Carr, a young man of about twenty-one years, only son of Mr. David Carr of Stanhope, went out to attend to some coal-trucks. He went alone in the boat. In the evening, about midnight, the boat was picked up by the waves. He was in twelve fathoms of water. The boat was young Carr's coat; the one over on the rowlocks, and the hat attached. It is supposed that he had reached the trawls, but in catching hold of the buoy attached lost his balance and fell over. The trawls were dragged this morning, but it was blowing hard and the sea very rough. No news of the finding of the body has yet come to hand.

P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL.—A large number of ladies and gentlemen assembled in the parlor of the Y. M. C. A. last evening for the annual meeting of the P. E. Island Hospital. The report of the trustees showed that 141 patients were treated in the Hospital during the past year, besides 54 out-patients. There were 69 surgical operations performed. The Hospital has all the appliances required for difficult surgical operations, and there is no necessity for patients going abroad for surgical treatment. A large proportion of the patients are unable to pay, the hospital is dependent upon the generosity of the public for its support. The retiring trustees, Messrs. Chas. Palmer and L. L. Beer, were unanimously re-elected. Two of the trustees now in the training school will graduate in the coming autumn. The financial statement shows a balance of \$110.22 on hand at the end of the year. The expenditure during the year amounted to \$5,379.21.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. MELBOURNE, May 29.—Sir John Madden in his message to the Victorian parliament yesterday, declared that prosperity was rapidly returning to Victoria, and that he said the government would introduce a bill providing for election by the people of a convention for the purpose of framing a constitution for federated Australia. Bills would also be introduced providing for revision of the tariff and to establish the principle of one man one vote. Public offences were also proposed.

VIENNA, May 29.—Droemer Lager, anti-sensitiser leader of the Reichstag, and vice-burgomaster of Vienna, to-day refused to accept the office of burgomaster, to which he had been elected, because the majority he received was the smallest permitted by law to elect a mayor of the city, and an excited mob made an attempt upon the town hall, which was stormed and taken possession of. Fierce fighting ensued between the mob and the police.

MONTREAL, May 29.—It is quite evident that Canadians have been looking for the Bond loan upon the wrong tree, and that the financial secretary's trip to the States was little more than a blind. It is understood that the Newfoundland loan has been subscribed for in Great Britain and will be issued by Glynn Mills, Currie & Co., one of the leading banking houses in England. It is also learned that Morton, Rose & Co. are, with other firms, interested in the loan. The loan in question is for \$550,000 4 per cent, 40 year stock. This, of course, is subject to all legal requirements being fulfilled. It is known that the Montreal agents of a London firm tried to place part of the loan here, but the influence of the Bank of Montreal was against the deal, which failed to go through.

ROME, May 29.—A bomb was thrown this morning in Lane, poor quarter of the city, where the agitation in favor of socialist deputy De Felice was the strongest throughout the recent political campaign. The bomb was charged with gunpowder and chlorate of potash, which were connected with a vial of nitric acid. The police believe an unsuccessful attempt to explode the bomb was made on Sunday while polling was in progress.

LONDON, May 29.—The Daily News, in referring to the persistent reports of the forthcoming dissolution of parliament, reaffirms that as far as the intention and expectation of the ministry are concerned, there is not the slightest foundation for the rumour.

HOPS, Kansas, May 29.—Hot winds from the south have been blowing for the past 36 hours. Farmers have given up all hope of raising anything. Hot winds are also blowing the fruit of the trees.

LONDON, May 29.—The Daily News publishes a despatch from Constantinople saying that as the Porte has failed to reply to the communication addressed to it regarding the Armenian reform scheme by the powers, Sir Philip Currie, British ambassador to Turkey has replied that a short period be fixed in which an answer will be furnished. It is reported Sir Philip also notified the Porte that no more concessions of the scheme will be accepted; that France and Russia concurred in the project finding that it could not be varied.

The cheque will be returned. The Department does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender.
