ENGLISH papers publish pretty full accounts of the ceremony in Paris on the 4th, at the formal presentation of M. Bartholdi's statue of "Liberty Enlightening the World" to the United States.

EXTRAORDINARILY low freights are prevailing in the Mediterranean. A ton of tallow can now be sent from Odessa to England for from 7s. to 9s. 2d. To ports in the Mediterranean the charge is only from 60 to 75c.

It is stated that the English Attorney-General, Sir Henry James, holds that colonial lawyers are on the same standing in English courts as English barristers. This is an important decision, and one on which the Canadian bar is to be congratulated.

It is stated that there were idle in the ports of a British Northeast coast on 5th inst., from want of employment, no fewer than 137 ocean going steamers of 150,000 tons gross, valued at over a million sterling, and employing 1,800 men when voyaging.

The steamer United Empire brought down from Duluth on her last trip the largest cargo which ever left that port. The cargo was 11,500 barrels of Minnesota flour, weighing about 1,200 tons, and comprising the lading of 81 cars from Minneapolis.

The English Government is actively promoting preventive measures against cholera, and, says a recent cable, the English public regards with wonder the French panic and the cowardice of whole cities, which has infected some other countries, where precautions of foolish severity have been taken.

It is proposed to hold a strawberry festival and promenade concert in the Drill Shed and adjoining grounds, on Tuesday, the 15th inst., proceeds of which will go towards paying the expenses of the improvements on Queen Square. Those ladies who feel inclined to take a part in assisting on the occasion will kindly meet at the Athenaeum, on Thursday the 10th inst., at 3.30 o'clock.

The wheat crop of last year in the States was said to be "short" by 100,000,000 bushels, and that of Canada also short by some 15,000,000 bushels. But there has been an abundant supply, at moderate rates, throughout the year. The prospects this year, in both countries, and indeed throughout the world, indicate a bountiful crop. Already new winter wheat, of splendid quality and yield, has made its appearance, while there is yet a plentiful supply of the old. All indications point to an abundant supply of the staff of life during a year to come.

A RATHER unpleasant incident took place in English financial circles a few days ago. It appears that the London stock-broker firm of Raphael & Sons, had sent a cable to an American house reflecting on the London credit of the American bankers, Messrs. Morton, Rose & Co., whose New York correspondents are Morton Bliss & Co. The Raphaels upon being called to account for the slander, gave the aggrieved bankers satisfaction, withdrew all reflection on their credit and stated that they had been misinformed. When Mr. Raphael made his appearance on the Stock Exchange a day or two ago after the assembled brokers expressed their disapproval of his conduct by hissing him.

A Washout in Westmoreland, N. B.
