

Red Wings Score 5-2 Victory Over Rangers; Howe Leading Scoring

DETROIT, Jan. 10 (CP)—Gordie Howe took over the National Hockey League goal scoring lead by tallying his 21st and 22nd goals of the season in leading Detroit Red Wings to a 5-2 victory over New York Rangers tonight before 10,229 fans.

Howe's pair put him ahead of Sid Abel (19) and Elmer Lach (18) of Montreal who have 21. The tallies also boosted his season point total to 37, tying Montreal's Elmer Lach for first place in that department.

The all-star right winger hit twice within 73 seconds late in the second period to break up a close 2-1 game.

The Wings were forced to come from behind for the triumph which boosted their N.H.L. lead to 12 points again over idle Toronto.

The Wings tied the count on a fluke tally as soon as they got a player edge. Metro Prystal was credited with the goal when his shot from the corner struck a Ranger player and deflected in.

It marked the first Detroit goal in 162 minutes and 55 seconds against Rayner who had blanked the Wings in the last two times out.

Sid Abel put Detroit ahead to stay early in the middle period with his sharp kill of Ted Lindsay's breakaway rebound. It was

Abel's 437th point as a Detroit player, breaking the club record set by Syd Howe.

College Heads Would Ban Sport Scholarships

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 (AP)—A special sports committee of United States college presidents recommended tonight that all athletic scholarships be abolished and that football practice and games be limited to the period from Sept. 1 to the first Saturday in December.

In a sweeping list of proposals which would change completely many practices now common in college sports, the presidents also recommended:

1. That all post-season games of any kind be abolished.
2. That basketball games and practice be confined to the period between Dec. 1 and March 15.
3. That baseball games and practice be confined to the period between March 1 and commencement.
4. That not only should no freshman be allowed to play on a varsity team, but also that any transfer from a junior college should put in a year of residence before being allowed to play.
5. That scholarships should be given strictly on the basis of the student's educational ability and his needs.
6. That in no case should any scholarship be for more than the educational expenses at an institution.

Dr. John Hannah, president of Michigan State College and chairman of the special committee set up by the American Council on Education, disclosed the plans at a press conference.

The new athletic code now goes to the executive committee of the council on education for approval or disapproval.

There is no indication how soon it will act, but Hannah told reporters previously that he hoped the sweeping new code would go into effect by the start of the next school year.

Glacé Bay Game Postponed

GLACÉ BAY, N. S., Jan. 10 (CP)—Arrangements by Saint John Beavers to fly here tonight for a Maritime Major Hockey League game fell through, forcing postponement of the tilt with Glacé Bay Miners. No reason was given for the airline's cancellation of the reservation.

Miners, who have found it a rough week without a home game, will meet Moncton Hawks in a postponed fixture at Amherst Friday. It will be a Miners' home game.

Glacé Bay Community Hockey Club took up the matter of today's cancellation with league president Judge J. E. Hudson but it was too late to have another team in action to replace Beavers.

Miners officials were upset about failure of Beavers to show up. Loss of two home games in a single week not only is a hard financial blow, but tends to make fans lose interest, a spokesman stated.

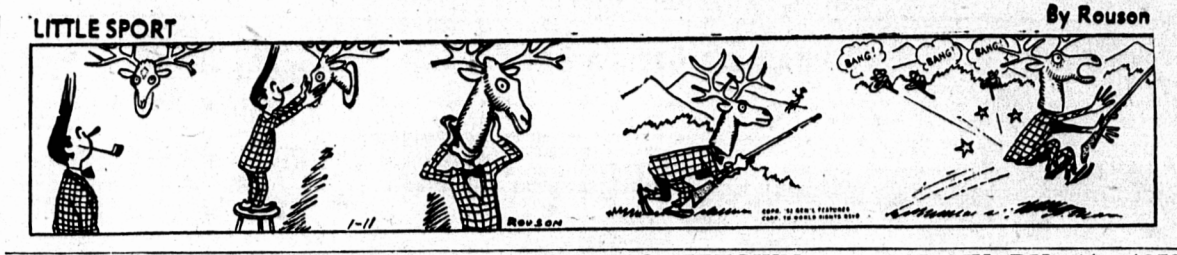
One alderman voted against the grant.

Advocates Milk Strike

TORONTO, Jan. 10 (CP)—Charles E. Harkness, president of the Ontario Cheese Producers' Association, today advocated a Canada-wide milk "strike" by hundreds of thousands of dairy farmers—a policy of withholding milk "to teach the Canadian public a lesson."

He told a meeting of 200 Ontario cheese producers that the dairy industry in Canada is losing \$1,000,000,000 a year. Child labor, high costs, margarine, and New Zealand imports combined to hit the industry.

"Our only answer is to withhold our milk from the market. Perhaps then we can teach a lesson to the Canadian people."



The surging Halifax Saints, all ready on the drive that they hope will land them a play-off berth have been having their good and bad fortunes as far as players are concerned. On the bright side of the ledger was the announcement yesterday that veteran left winger Billy Warwick had checked into Halifax to the surprise of coach Bill Ford, Ken MacKenzie, Bob Drainville and Danny Nixon.

To counteract this effect on the team was the report that Morley MacNeill was leaving for Buffalo and that forward Doug Lewis, who suffered a shoulder injury in Charlottetown Monday night, will likely be out for the rest of the season.

After what MacNeill did here Monday night the Islanders should not be sorry to see him leave. The slap shot artist tied up the game for the Saints with two second period goals, both of which were nice efforts. The 21-year-old MacNeill is one of the most improved defencemen in the league and is likely going to move in exchange for goalie O'Hearn and defenceman Frank Bergeron who came to the Saints from Syracuse.

According to reports Billy Warwick left Ottawa for either Halifax or Sydney but landed in Halifax. The 27-year-old left winger has been in hockey a long time and has seen extensive pro service including a short fling with the Rangers. Already this season he has played with the Buffalo Bisons, the Quebec Aces and the Ottawa Senators. He was loaned from Buffalo to Quebec but went to the Senators when Tommy Gorman bought his contract from the Bisons. Warwick and Gorman, however, did not see eye to eye and Warwick was the one who left Ottawa. The Halifax radio reports that the Saints may get another player, a defenceman from the Seattle Ironmen.

The Saints win last night moves them into a fourth place tie with the Moncton Hawks with both teams only two points behind the Glacé Bay Miners and six points back of the Islanders. Halifax coach Will Fields has his sights set on second place, the most coveted spot in the league standings. By the way his team is going right now Fields may well feel optimistic about his chances of getting into second place. It's still a long way until play-offs, however. By that time Fields may be glad to settle for fourth place.

Those who saw the Islanders-Sydney game on Wednesday night claim the Islanders were going well. They gave all appearances of having shaken out of their recent slump and they could not have chosen a better time to start winning games in Sydney than on Wednesday. Willie Marshall and Don Bellinger may be out of hospital today and will probably be ready to play by the middle of next week. Barring injuries and sickness the Islanders should be a tough team from here in.

Coach Leo Lamoureux is not letting any grass grow under the boys' feet. Yesterday morning he had them out for an hour's shooting practise. They used a dummy goaltender in the net or a board that leaves only four holes through which the players can put the puck into the cage. Leo wants the boys to be able to thread a needle with a puck.

Warwick was reported headed for Sydney Millionaires originally but apparently changed his mind and wound up with a \$250-weekly job with Saints.

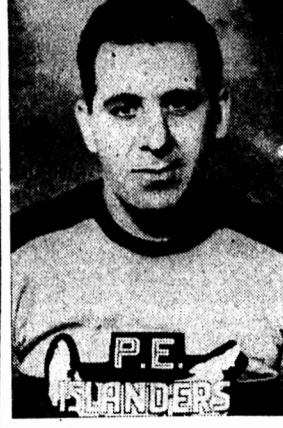

Robinson Signs 1952 Contract

BROOKLYN, Jan. 10 (AP)—Jackie Robinson signed his 1952 Brooklyn contract calling for an estimated \$40,000 Wednesday and predicted he would never last as long as Joe DiMaggio did.

Accompanying the Robinson signing was an announcement that Clyde Sukeforth, veteran Dodger coach, had resigned and that his place would be taken by Billy Herman, former National League infielder now managing a club in the Cuban winter league.

"I'm afraid I haven't much chance of lasting with Joe," Jackie told a press conference. "One thing is all that college playing. I played hard. Another thing is my weight. It's against my lasting more than a few more years unless I can find some way to control it."

Jackie, just short of his 33rd birthday, was an all-around star at U.C.L.A. a dozen years ago, one of the top flight football backs the coast conference has produced. DiMaggio retired as a Yankee center fielder at the ripe athletic age of 37.

As Jackie's salary for last season — believed to have been \$35,000 — was the highest on the Brooklyn club, it will be necessary for the Salary Stabilization Board at Washington to approve the pact he signed today. Dodger officials anticipate no difficulty there.

Sukeforth, who had been with the Dodgers since 1943, gave no reason for quitting the organization, but admitted he "had plans." A good guess is that he intends to rejoin his old boss, Branch Rickey, as coach for Pittsburgh Pirates.

There might be a story behind it. Sukeforth was in charge of the Brooklyn bullpen when Ralph Branca was sent in to pitch to Bobby Thomson in the ninth inning of the final play-off game against the Giants last fall. It may be recalled that Bobby smote a home run.

There have been reports since that manager Charlie Dresen, faced with the choice of using either Branca or young Clem Labine in the crucial spot, accepted Sukeforth's word that Branca was "ready." If true, this conceivably could have led to strained relations between manager and coach.

84 Entries For Steeplechase At Aintree April 5

LONDON, Jan. 10 (AP)—A field of 84 entries, headed by three former winners, was announced for the 108th running of the Grand National Steeplechase at Aintree, April 5th.

Among those nominated were Nickel Coin, I. J. Tan and Derriestown, which finished in that order in last year's race. These were the only three out of a field of 36 to complete the grind of four miles, 836 yards over Aintree's murderous fences and water jumps.

Ted Williams Recalled By U. S. Marines

Boston, Jan. 10 (AP)—Ted Williams, the Boston Red Sox \$100,000-plus slugger, was recalled by the United States Marines for what is expected to be at least 17 months of active duty.

A flying instructor in the marines from 1943-45, Williams has been ordered to report at nearby Quantan for a physical examination April 2. If found fit, he will start eight weeks of re-indoctrination training May 2.

Reports from Washington were that Williams, now 33, is one of several hundreds of former marine fliers recalled to provide replacements for Korean veterans soon to be released from active duty.

When the announcement was made Williams was, fishing in the Gulf of Mexico.

In Washington, a Marine Corps spokesman said Williams would be ranked as a captain and would be required to serve 17 months, the statutory limit for reserve officers recalled involuntarily.

"Williams will be a terrific loss to us, despite the fact we have seven other outfielders," Red Sox general manager Joe Cronin said. "But we'll make the best of it."

Cronin said that Williams' 1952 contract was mailed a few days ago. The Red Sox executive refused to give any details about it. It was presumed, however, that the \$16 batting average Williams compiled in 1944 games last season did not warrant a reduction in his six-figure salary.

At Sarasota, Fla., where he is about to open a training school for Red Sox rookies, the Sox' new manager Lou Boudreau also said he was "taken completely by surprise" by the Williams' recall.

"We can't replace Ted, despite the fact we're well stocked with experienced outfielders," Boudreau who hit in 100 runs and more every season are priceless," Boudreau added.

Williams was the last major leaguer to enter the charmed 400-batting circle, which he did with a .406 mark in 1941.

Twice voted the American League's most valuable player, in 1946 and 1949, Williams hit well over .300 during each of his 10 seasons
