**A CHALLENGE.**

The electors of today are not particularly interested in what the Sullivan-Ferguson Administration did. They want to know what the Farquharson party did. How the Government party fulfilled their promises and dealt with the trusts confided to them by the electors; whether they have husbanded the resources of the Province; whether they have squandered road money in electioneering, etc.; what about our present assets in the Land Office and at Ottawa; is their corruption in the administration which is now seeking a renewal of the people's confidence and support? These are among the questions in the issue that is now being tried by the electors of Prince Edward Island. But the Patriot persists in discussing the dead issues of the past.

Now we challenge the Patriot to come down to business and prove that the Farquharson party has made ends meet according to promise [and has not been guilty of squandering public money to gain votes; if it cannot prove the Government guiltless, perhaps it will offer some excuse that the electors will accept. The people of this Province are not unreasonable. But they can't afford to be plunged into debt by those who have the management of their public affairs. If the Farquharson Government cannot satisfy them upon the essential points in their record—who dare say that the electors will not be justified in voting them out of office on the 12th day of December.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

HAVING closed an immense contract with the government for armor plate at his own figures, Andrew Carnegie feels it a pleasant duty to establish a \$5,000,000 technical school at Pittsburg, Pa. His business shrewdness as well as his private generosity are to be admired.

It is probable that Messrs. Birch and Buote (E. J. Buote, the clever young editor of L'Impartial) will be the candidates on the Opposition side in the First District of Prince. Mr. Birch has been a good representative and Mr. Buote ought to make a model one—our Acadian friends might be proud of.

The Mad and Empire remarks that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte may win an election on a racial or sectional cry; but they cannot build up a united nation on such [food]. The appeal to passion must not be accentuated. We ought all to try to repair the damage which greed of office has in some measure wrought.

The leader of the Opposition in Quebec has issued a card, in the course of which he says: "For more than twenty-two years that I have been a member, I have attentively followed the actions of our Legislature, and I assert, without fear of contradiction, that opposition is essential to all good legislation and all good governments, especially in this province."

PREMIER FARQUHARSON argued during the Dominion election contest that the increase of the price of binder twine was due to the increase of the price of manila. But the telegrams report dividends of 90 to 100 per cent to shareholders

of binder bonuses. This will show how much dependence is to be placed in Premier Farquharson.

We notice that The Guardian has received Scotch and English papers from a kind friend in Edinburgh, evidently of Grit persuasion. In newspapers, it appears, glory in the Laurier-Paré victory, and we may add that the same papers gloried when the Government took up prohibition, but were as dumb as oysters when the Government refused to take action on the plebiscite vote.

We insert today another letter on the turning down of Mr. Rogers. But we agree with the Patriot that the discussion should cease. While THE EXAMINER'S remarks are "the cold crack," etc., were expressive of public opinion in the town, they were meant to be interpreted as merely badger, without a spark of ill-feeling. We have no quarrel with those who discarded Mr. Rogers and took Mr. Hughes. It is a family matter among the supporters of the Farquharson administration, and if they are satisfied the Opposition have no cause of complaint.

PROFESSOR FLETCHER, Botanist of the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, falls in completely with the suggestion of Rev. Father Burke to hold a weed show on the Island next year so that really noxious weeds may be recognized easily by all our farmers and the means for their extermination properly understood. Those unprofitable tenants of our fields as well as being unsightly are eating up the plant food of our soil at an alarming rate and it is high time that farmers banded together against their further spread. Clean farming is the only profitable farming, as well as being a pleasure to regard. We hope to see the weed show materialize and know its will confer incalculable benefit on the community.

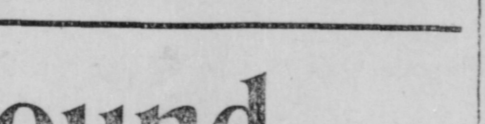

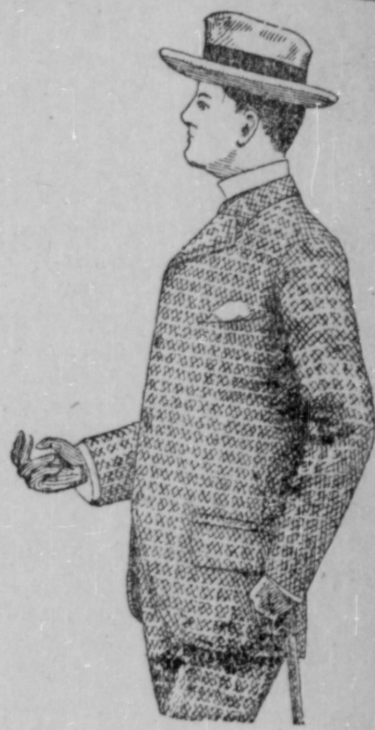
