

Financial Statement Of Islanders Club Released

The total deficit of the Islanders Hockey Club for the past two seasons was \$14,567.70 according to a statement released for publication last night. Of this amount \$9,232.40 was incurred last season and \$4,933.30 the previous year.

In the income bracket gate receipts at home totalled \$74,553.29 while holding seats brought \$10,114.62. Donations amounted to \$4,121.12 and away from home games brought \$3,984.09. Programs amounting to \$98,176.16.

Wages accounted for the major part of the expenses as they came to a total of \$71,693.18. Travel cost another \$19,343.94 and equipment \$7,214.70. Players' transportation, training camp expenses and other costs in connection with securing players cost \$5,982.06. Total expenses amounted to \$107,536.86.

Medical, administration, League insurance, printing costs and bank charges accounted for the remainder of the expenses.

In releasing the statement an executive spokesman stated that it was hoped to remove part of the deficit through a series of weekly entertainments and programs.

He stated that the average attendance at home games last season was 1832 and this staunch support was very much appreciated. He predicted that with the same average attendance next year together with the reduced salaries, travelling costs and refereeing expenses it would be possible to operate at a profit.

"The executive feels that the people of the Province are desirous of having Major League Hockey again next season," he stated. He said that efforts were being made to secure the services of a top notch coach to guide a strong Islanders team in next winter's hockey league.

Although he had nothing official to announce about the holding seats he said that they would be sold shortly, possibly this week.

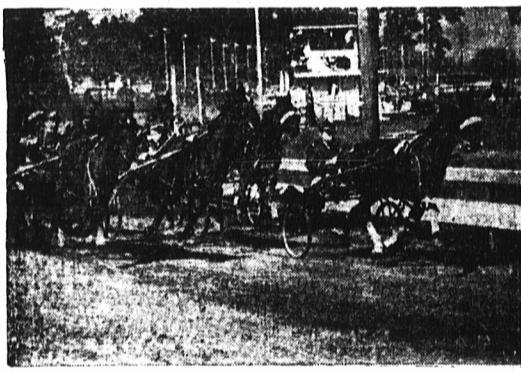

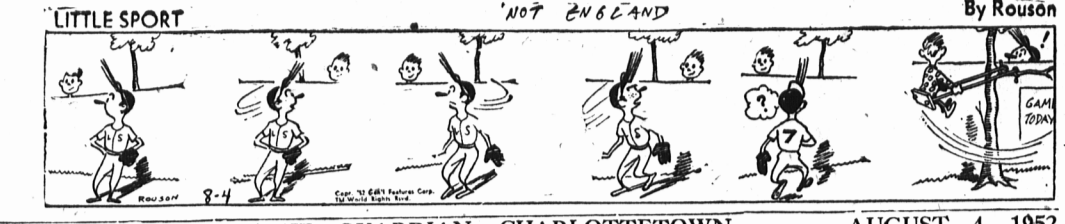

At Saturday's meeting here, League President Judge J. Elliott Hudson read a telegram from a Saint John official stating that the Beavers wanted to return to Allan Cup hockey next season. That telegram was not written by a member of the Club backing the Beavers. Things took a different complexion last night, however, when Judge Hudson announced that he had received a letter in Halifax from Saint John officials asking for more time to set their plans.

Business Discussed At Major Hockey League Meeting Here Saturday

A four team Maritime Major Hockey League without representation from either of New Brunswick's leading hockey centres, Moncton or Saint John, will operate next season, it was decided Saturday afternoon at an M. M. H. L. meeting here.

The four teams which will participate in the league are Halifax Saint Mary's, Sydney Millionaires, Glouce Bay Miners and the Charlottetown Islanders.

The Saint John Beavers and the Moncton Hawks both forfeited their franchise. The Beavers, last year's Maritime champions, lost theirs as they failed to notify the meeting of their intentions to operate again next season. Moncton, after a brief consideration at the meeting, decided to string along with Saint John.

The door was left open for both teams to re-enter the league, however. Teams have until August 31 to apply for a franchise and requested an extension of time before deciding if they would operate a team this season.

"It is understood that the reason Moncton withdrew from the league was because Saint John was not represented. It is possible that during August applications from both Beavers and Hawks will be presented to the league for consideration of its members."

The decision of Moncton, who only recently had signed Morrey Hamilton as a playing coach, came as a surprise.

The Hawks gave notice a week ago they would operate again on the basis that Saint John and Halifax would be in the league. When they learned that Saint John was not interested they discussed the matter briefly and gave their decision. Their spokesman, G.N. Robinson.

Canadians Oust Mexicans From Davis Cup Play

MONTREAL, Aug. 3—(CP)—Canada today took the two final singles matches in first-round North American zone Davis Cup tennis play with Mexico to make a clean sweep of the five matches.

The victory, won Saturday with a triumph in the doubles, enables Canada to advance into the zone finals against the United States here at week-end.

In the first match of the afternoon, Lorne Main defeated Mario Llamas, Mexico's No. 1 player, 6-4, 3-6, 6-8, 6-4, 6-1 and in the second singles encounter, Brendan Maclean defeated Manuel Galeana 6-2, 6-3, 6-4.

Main, from Vancouver and Montreal, slammed back everything the wily Llamas had to offer in the first set but the cagey Mexican took the next two by playing a purposely soft game.

Main plays better on a hard service and Llamas made a point of not giving him anything he could slam back.

The 21-year-old Main regained control in the last two sets, forcing Llamas to play a powerful game.

Main kept his service four times and lost it three times, during the 6-8 third set, while Llamas kept his five times and lost it only twice.

The Macken-Galeana match was not nearly as interesting from a spectator's point of view.

The heavy Mexican usually plays a steady game, but he became erratic in the first set when Macken slammed back everything he had to offer.

He steadied in the last two sets, and it wasn't until the seventh game in both cases when Macken was able to break his service.

Bufalo Vega, Mexican playing captain, was to have played, but he stepped down in favor of Galeana.

Friday, Main defeated Vega and Macken defeated Llamas. In doubles Saturday, Main and Henri Rochon downed Llamas and Galeana.

Jack Spencer, fourth man on the Canadian team, did not see action.

U. S. Comes From Behind To Snatch Team Lead As Olympic Games End

HELSINKI, Aug. 3—(CP)—The Olympic torch was extinguished today and the great white Olympic flag with its five interlocking circles was hauled down—end of the brilliant international sports festival in which the United States came from behind with a sensational rush to snatch the unofficial team leadership from Russia.

Britain won its only first place in the games by taking the Prix de Nations, colorful equestrian event that traditionally closes the solid two weeks of competition.

Chile placed second in this final event—a severe test of horsemanship over high barriers—and the U. S. was third.

This brought the total points for the U. S. to 614 against 553 1-2 for Russia in the unofficial standing.

65,000 At Closing

There were 65,000 persons in Olympic Stadium when the flags of 70 nations that sent 5,780 athletes to Helsinki appeared in a final parade and the call was sounded for the youth of the world to reassemble in Melbourne, Australia, in 1956.

The drama and record-breaking that have been a daily part of these games since July 19 were climaxed Saturday in the tremendous surge of point-scoring by the U. S.—111 points in the single day to wipe out Russia's lead that had lasted 12 days.

The U. S. defeated Russia 36-21 to retain the basketball championship, won an all-important first in the men's 1,500-metre swim, scored a triple in the women's high-diving competition and topped all this off with a blazing five-for-five performance in the boxing games.

The winning of five gold medals in boxing by any country is an Olympic record in itself and the deluge of championships ended the boxing-titling famine that had plagued the U. S. since the 1923 games.

The U. S. was Trailing

The U. S. entered Saturday's last full day of competition trailing Russia by 24 1-2 points. The standing then showed Russia, competing for the first time in the games and trotting out a capable sportsmanship-conscious band of athletes, with 523 1-2 points. The U. S. had 499.

The whittling down of the lead started with the basketball final. The U. S. team, made up of players from the Peoria, Ill., Caterpillars and the University of Kansas, found it had its hands full in what turned out to be the lowest-scoring game of the entire tournament, 36-25. Previously in the round-robin tournament the U. S. had romped off to an 86-58 victory.

This time the Russians came up with a baffling, half-control play. It was highly effective and the towering Americans were tense and thrown off balance.

The Americans led by a thin 17-15 edge at half time, and early in the second half had surrendered the lead to Russia, 21-20.

Then Bob Kenney drew two free throws and sank them both. The U. S. was never headed after that.
