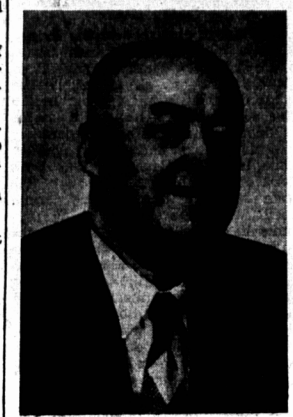

Pioneer In Tourist Trade



—A pioneer of the tourist cabin trade on Prince Edward Island, Mr. E. E. Parkman, (above), proprietor of the Harbor View Cabins at Summerside has been catering to this type of trade for the past 20 years, which is believed to be longer than that of any other cabin operator in the Province.

Mr. Parkman, a practicing optometrist, has witnessed an amazing expansion of the tourist trade in this Province, since he first began business with three cabins back in 1934.

Since that time his facilities have expanded to become the largest in the Province with 47 cabins and cottages ranging from two to five rooms, and this number will be increased during the summer.

In addition to this, construction has started on a building that will be used as an office, and as a lounge in which guests may congregate for the showing of films, etc.

Located in a picturesque setting beside the beautiful, sheltered harbor of Summerside, guests may enjoy the privacy of their all modern cabin, walk along the shore front on a 1500 foot boardwalk, sunbathe on the safe sandy beach, or swim in the warm salt water.

Located amid the soft green lawns is a playground for the children, and a horseshoe court for the older folk.

Regarding prospects for 1954 Mr. Parkman said inquiries and reservations which range from many parts of U.S.A., Ontario, and Quebec are already equal to those of last year, and some of his guests have been returning annually for as long as 15 years.

In his long experience in the business, Mr. Parkman said he found that individual cottages were preferred because of the privacy they offered.

As an encouragement to prospective visitors who might spend their holidays on the Island he has prepared an attractive booklet which, among other information, contains a mileage chart, church services, car ferry time tables, and a comprehensive map of Summerside indicating several places of interest to tourists.

He said the majority of people seem to take holidays in July and August, and this was sometimes made necessary in the case of families whose children had to return to school in September.

During the tourist season Mr. Parkman employs seven maids and two men to look after the care and maintenance of his tourist camp.
