O'Leary Re-elects Commissioners, Adopts Budget

Messrs. Alton Raynor, Bernard Shea and Ralph Adams were re-appointed Commissioners last night at the first annual meeting of the partially incorporated village of O'Leary. A budget for the incoming year was presented and totalled \$1,330. It included the installation of five new street lights, bringing the number to 30 in all. The sum of \$200 was voted for repairs to the Fire Hall and after considerable discussion it was decided to purchase a suitable fire truck for the Department. It was also decided to purchase two water tanks holding approximately 400 to 500 gallons each, and a pump. Total cost not to exceed \$1,200.

Total budget for the coming year was set at \$3,130. The rate of taxation was set at 3-4 of one per cent. It was also decided to petition Government representatives that grade eleven be provided for O'Leary and several speakers including Dr. L. G. Dewar spoke on this subject. The meeting passed a hearty vote of thanks to the Commissioners who were unanimously re-elected.

Opposition leader Atlee rose in the debate to charge that Churchill's speech in Washington had been "good salesmanship" but I do not think it is good statesmanship. Atlee said one American writer interpreted Churchill's speech as a willingness to join the U.S. in such measure as bombing Manchurian airfields and blockading Communist China. The former Prime Minister said he hated the "stupid anti-Americanism" in some parts of the country, but Britain must not be regarded "as the mere tool of any other country."

Mr. William Jenkins of the Jenkins Brothers Ltd., canners, was elected as councillor for the Summerside East Ward yesterday by a majority of 150 votes. This was the first venture into local politics by Mr. Jenkins. In the Centre Ward, Mr. T. D. Morrison, whose term expired this year, was re-elected. He defeated Mr. T. D. Carruthers by a majority of 13 votes. Mr. Carruthers had been a member of the Summerside Town Council for several terms in past years. Mr. Clarence Steele, in the West Ward, retained his seat in the council by defeating Mr. Norman Prichard by a majority of 84 votes.

In the Water and Sewerage Commission there were two contestants for the vacancy created by the expiry of the term of Mr. Carol Delaney. Mr. Andrew Perry

polled a total of 777 votes in the three wards against that of his opponent, Mr. Edgar Cannon, who polled 476 votes. The total vote polled by each candidate is as follows:

Crapaud Names New Commissioner Last Night

Mr. Lloyd Rogerson, manager of the Crapaud Creamery and Cold Storage Co., last night was elected the new commissioner in Crapaud at the second annual meeting of the residents of that village. The first in P. E. I. to be incorporated under the Village Service Act. Under the act the affairs of this village are conducted by three commissioners, one of whom retires from office each year. Mr. Rogerson, whose election was without opposition, succeeds Mr. John Leard, who retired from the board of commissioners at last night's meeting. The other commissioners are B. C. Wood and Arthur Simmons. The report of Mr. Nelson Molyneux, village clerk, showed the village to be in good financial standing and free of debt. The Crapaud Fire Department was summoned one time during the year, the call being to Albany where the department was instrumental in saving a large potato warehouse that was on fire. During the year the Fire Department added 100 feet of hose to its equipment. Considerable discussion took place regarding a contract between the village and the Maritime Electric Company, regarding street lighting. The village had made a contract with the company to supply street lighting, but recently the company informed the village that the rate would be raised.

Fine One-Room School Is Opened At Margate

The official opening of the new one-room classroom school at Margate to accommodate grades one to seven took place on Monday evening, February 4. The chairman of the meeting was Mr. Heath Mayhew, one of the trustees of the school. Present for the occasion were Premier J. Walter Jones, who is also Minister of Education, Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, Dr. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister and Director of Education, Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, chief superintendent of schools and Mr. C. B. Jelly, superintendent of schools for this section of the province. Premier Jones in his opening remarks complimented the trustees and the ratepayers of Margate school district for their interest in providing such a school for their children. He stated that from his earliest recollection Margate had been one of the finest farming communities in Prince Edward Island and he was glad to see that the people presently living in Margate were upholding the fine traditions of the past as evidenced by the completion of this school, which, he said, was one of the finest one-room schools in the Maritimes. Hon. Mr. Baker expressed pleasure at being able to return to the district where he was brought up and received his early education to officiate at the opening of the new school. Dr. Shaw gave great credit to the trustees, Messrs. Profit, Mayhew and Johnson, for the capable manner in which they had discharged their duties from the commencement of the building of the school to its completion. In speaking to the children, Dr. Shaw charged them to keep the property in the years to come, as is a fine condition as it was on the opening night. Messrs. MacKenzie and Jelly, supervisors, also expressed pleasure at being in attendance at the meeting. They congratulated the trustees and ratepayers on the completion of the new school. Miss Miriam Hickey, the Margate teacher, said how pleased she was at having the honor of being the first teacher in the new school and stated that it was a pleasure to work in a school so well lighted and comfortable. It was such a contrast to the old school which the new building replaced. Also present was Rev. Mr. Haslam, who spoke in glowing terms of the progressive spirit of the Margate district people. There was a very large attendance of the people of Margate at the meeting as well as those of surrounding districts.—S.
