Ramblers Come From Behind To Tie Hawks

MONCTON, (CP) — A pair of goals two minutes apart early in the third period earned Amherst Ramblers a 2-2 overtime draw with Moncton Hawks Wednesday night in a regular Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League game.

Moncton grabbed a 1-0 lead in the first period, boosted the count to 2-0 when Bob Bonviss finished off a power play while Ramblers were short-handed.

Amherst, sparked by the veteran Sherman White, rode back to square the mark. White scored at 3:40 and two minutes later wingman Dave Kiley batted the puck past Nick Pidosny for the equalizer.

The overtime period was scoreless.

England Downs Germany In International Soccer

LONDON, (CP) — England defeated a weakened German soccer team 3-1 before 100,000 fans Wednesday but the winners' form did little to stimulate hopes for a revival of England's international prestige.

Although Germany won the international championship last summer, illness and injury left only three members of the title-winning squad in the lineup Wednesday.

The youthful German second-stringers were keen, but not of championship calibre.

England's forward line, while it showed individual brilliance, lacked the clockwork precision of last summer's German champions or the Hungarians whom they defeated for the title. The top stars were veterans like Stanley Matthews, Owen Phillips and goal-keeper Bert Williams, making his first international appearance in four years.

Matthews, the 39-year-old Blackpool performer who faced Germany in international competition for the first time 19 years ago, was instrumental in setting up England's first goal.

FREE KICK
It came off a free kick on which the defenders were bewildered when Len Shackleton ran up as if to take the kick and Ronnie Allen cut in to kick the ball. Matthews shared the rebound and centred perfectly to Roy Bentley, who drove the ball home.

The first half ended with no further scoring although the Germans were showing signs of firing under the stiff pace.

Three minutes after the interval Allen increased England's lead, finding a corner of the net after German goaltender Fritz Herken-

Seixas-Trabert Send U. S. Davis Cup Stocks Up

MELBOURNE, (AP) — Vic Seixas and Tony Trabert sent America's Davis Cup stocks up another notch Wednesday when they subdued Australia's Lew Hoad and Ken Rosewall in a bitterly-fought, five-set semi-final doubles match in the Victoria tennis championships.

The U. S. tandem, surprise winners last year in the challenge-round doubles, turned back the 20-year-old Aussies, 10-12, 6-2, 3-6, 6-2, 1-4.

Now they go into Friday's finals against Wimbledon champions Rex Hartwig and Mervyn Rose, another Australian cup possibility. Hartwig and Rose were less impressive heading the makeshift combination of Neale Fraser and Ham Richardson, American college champion, 6-1, 12-14, 6-2, 7-5.

LONE AMERICAN
Seixas, the U. S. champion, is the lone American among three unfriendly Aussies in the singles semi-finals today. He plays top-seeded Hoad in one match, while Hartwig and Rosewall clash in the other.

The Australian cup selectors will be watching this closely. If Hartwig, who trounced Trabert in straight sets Tuesday, can beat Rosewall again, he is almost sure to get the Davis Cup singles spot.

Montreal Royals Name Manager

MONTREAL, (CP) — President Hector Racine of Montreal Royals announced Wednesday Greg Mulleavy will manage this city's team in the International League next season.

Mulleavy, 47, had major league experience as a player and was also second-baseman and shortstop with Buffalo Bisons of the International loop. He has since managed clubs in Jamestown, N. Y., and Mobile, Ala.

Mulleavy succeeds Max Macon, who piloted the Royals to a second-place finish last season and is believed headed for St. Paul Saints of the American Association.

Mulleavy is married to the former Dode Marie Giroux of Quebec City.

Yankees, Orioles Complete Big Baseball Deal

HOUSTON, (AP) — The New York Yankees and Baltimore Orioles finally completed their 18-man "Bob Turley" deal Wednesday after the minor league draft machinery had disposed of a low total of 44 players for \$133,450.

Details of the "Turley deal" had leaked out by dimes and drabs until only official confirmation was lacking. The two clubs made it official after the final draft session "unfroze" the rosters of minor league clubs.

Infielder Kal Segrist (291 at Kansas City), infielder Don Lepert (413 at Birmingham) and left-handed pitcher Bill Miller (6-1 with the Yankees) go to Baltimore in the new switch. Outfielder Ken Woodling, shortstop Willie Miranda, catcher Gus Triandos and Hal Smith and pitchers Harry Byrd and Jim McDonald had been announced earlier.

GET SIX
The Yankees will get six new men, including five for their farm system in addition to the original package of pitchers Bob Turley, Don Lepert and shortstop Billy Hunter. Thus the deal comes down to nine for nine, although only four actually wind up on the Yankee roster.

First baseman Dick Kryhoski (290 at Baltimore), a former Yankee, returns to New York. Pitcher Mike Byrka (1-5 at Baltimore), outfielder Jim Pridler (247 at Baltimore) and catcher Darrell Johnson (252 at Richmond) go to the Yankees' American Association farm, now Denver, but formerly the Kansas City Blues. Centre fielder Ted D'Amico (221 at Wichita in the Western League) goes to the Yankees' Birmingham farm in the Southern Association. Another player to be named in April will come to the Yankees. There was a report the player, who is supposed to be a pitcher, would be Lou Kretlow 6-11 at Baltimore.

Given Okay To Move Franchise

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — The American Association Wednesday unanimously granted St. Louis Cardinals permission to negotiate for transfer of its Columbus, Ohio franchise to Omaha, Neb., now in the Western League.

George Sleser, Columbus general manager, has been negotiating with the Western League, which is asking a reported \$100,000 damages for loss of the Omaha territory. Cardinals own both the Columbus and Omaha franchises.

Ed Doherty, American Association president, said the negotiations were strictly between the Cardinals and the Western League.

Sleser said Cardinals had lost \$400,000 in Columbus in the last two years, his term as general manager there.

The International League has been reported interested in Columbus if it became open territory. An International League group is investigating Miami, Fla., as a possible site for its Ottawa franchise, owned by Kansas City Athletics.

Earlier this week the Kansas City Blues' franchise was shifted to Denver.
