He also said our information bureau should be at Borden, rather than on the outskirts of Summerside. We should be able to take honest criticism. It will help us not to become too complacent about this beautiful vacation land, and to exert ourselves more to make it even better than it is now.

Injured In Motorcycle, Car Collision

David Schurman, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Schurman, Central Bedeque, had his left wrist broken, his left ankle sprained, and received multiple minor bruises just at dark last evening when the Royal Enfield motorcycle on which he was riding was struck by a car driven by Gilbert Arsenault of Bedeque.

The accident occurred on the highway opposite the feed warehouse operated by Amalgamated Dairies at Central Bedeque.

Mr. Arsenault, accompanied by his wife and members of his family, was proceeding in the direction of Summerside and was in the process of turning into the warehouse yard where he intended to pick up some feed when the collision occurred.

The motorcycle was proceeding along the highway in the opposite direction to the car. When the crash happened the motorcycle rider was thrown to the pavement and the car, before coming to a halt, continued off the pavement dragging the motorcycle underneath the front end.

The injured rider, David Schurman, last spring completed his fourth year studies at Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown.

Following his accident last evening he received medical attention from Dr. H. M. Simms in Bedeque and was removed to Prince County Hospital where late last night he was resting as comfortably as could be expected.

Football Gets Underway In West Tonight

By THE CANADIAN PRESS At least 15 weekends and 44 games of Western Conference professional football begins tonight. The 40-game regular schedule of the Western Interprovincial Football Union will open with traditional rivalry, The Grey Cup champion Edmonton Eskimos meet Calgary Stampeders in the Cow Town, while Winnipeg Blue Bombers go against Saskatchewan Roughriders at Regina.

In Monday night games Edmonton is at Winnipeg, while Stampedeers open the Vancouver season against British Columbia Lions, who won only one game in WIFU play last season.

Each of the five teams will play 16 games, eight of them at home, by Oct. 29. The two-game, total-point semifinals open Nov. 5, and the best-of-three finals on Remembrance Day.

By next weekend, all five clubs must cut down to the 12 imports allowed them under altered WIFU regulations. The eastern Big Four teams this year will carry 10 imports.

In tonight's action, each team will dress 28 players, despite Winnipeg line coach Larry Cabrelli's contention that such a number is "ridiculous." If Bombers were allowed to dress "30 or 33 players, which is ideal," he says, "then we could do something."

Arnold Palmer Takes Over 5-Stroke Golf Open Lead

WESTON, Ont. (CP)—Arnold Palmer of Latrobe, Pa., who hit the three spectators in his third round, played with a steel nerve and the assuredness of a veteran Friday to take over a five-stroke lead in the Canadian open golf championship after three rounds. Palmer, 25-year-old newcomer to the circuit, fired a dazzling 64 Friday to set up a three-round total of 195, a record for any three rounds in the tournament.

It was a sizzling day for Palmer in sizzling weather and hot enough to cause the temperamental Tommy Bolt of Chattanooga to explode. Tommy lost both his temper and his caddy, changing bag-toters at the 12th hole.

Bolt's first caddy quit after telling a reporter Bolt had been giving him a rough time all day. Palmer threatened to make it a two-stroke lead.

Little Jackie Burke, Jr., of Kiamish Lake, N. Y., tried valiantly to make up strokes on the ex-U.S. amateur champ. Burke himself shot a five-under-par 67 to stay in the closest spot with 200, but he was three strokes worse off than he was at the half-way mark Thursday.

It was a case of perfection golf by the 26-year-old newcomer. He rolled up a string of nine birdies and went over par only at the 235-yard par three 11th when his drive was to the right and he pitched short.

Reveal Both Dodgers And Giants May Move Unless New Parks Are Provided

By WILL GRIMSLEY NEW YORK (AP)—City officials were told Friday that both Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants may be forced to move from their present sites unless they are provided new baseball parks. Walter O'Malley, president of the Dodgers, issued the warning at an informal meeting with Mayor Robert Wagner and some of his aides. O'Malley said unless a suitable new site for Brooklyn games is found by 1958 the club may move away, with the Giants following suit.

"Personally, I believe this problem is bigger than the Dodgers alone," the Brooklyn executive said. "If anybody went, the two teams would go. But that doesn't mean we couldn't play in the general area of New York City."

Wagner, following an hour-long conference, promised the matter would be discussed by the board of estimate, probably next Wednesday. "We want to help you," the mayor said.

O'Malley prodded city officials into action last Tuesday with the surprise announcement that the Dodgers plan to play next season in Jersey City and would not continue to play in Ebbets Field, their present home, after the 1957 campaign.
