MONDAY

Major D. J. McCormack, acting officer commanding the 28th L.A.A. Regiment, has been promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel and to command the unit. The promotion, one of four within the regiment, was announced by officials Saturday night.

Other promotions were those of Capt. Michael Campbell, to the rank of Major; Lieut. Vernon Walter MacLean to Captain, and Corporal Wanda MacMillan of the orderly room to Officer Cadet. It is believed that the latter is the first such appointment to be made here since the last war.

"We made considerable progress towards ironing out the Highway Traffic Act with a view to having uniformity in this highly important matter," said Mr. F. A. Large, Q.C., when questioned on Saturday evening regarding the Uniform Legislation Commission sitting in Quebec City last week. "The desire is prevalent in the United States as well as with the Canadian Provinces to agreeing on uniformity throughout both countries in the matter of traffic so that motorists may pass from province to province and state to state with the assurance that the same traffic regulations obtain."

The Anglican Young People held their eighth annual Prayer, Young People's Conference at their church centre, Camp Kingston in Craupod over the past Labor Day week-end. There was a record attendance with almost every parish represented.

TUESDAY

About 20 miles of new electric light lines have been built this year by the Summerside municipality owned light and power company, and electric light lines now under construction in the Belmont-Mischaucha area will be completed this week, according to the report of Councillor Donald Lidstone at the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening.

Mayor Wedge, who presided at the meeting, said that another 30-40 miles can be taken care of by this plant, and mentioned the areas of Arlington, Grand River, Malpeque, Indian River, and Hamilton.

"The Japanese are a very happy fun-loving people and apparently hold no resentment against their former enemies," said Major A. R. Smith of the Canadian Army Dental Corps in addressing the Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Major Smith, who has just returned from a 13 month tour of duty in the Korean theatre of war commented on the dense population of Japan as compared with the vast open spaces in Canada, which he said looked good to him in his flight from coast to coast. He flew from Tokyo to Moncton in two

days, approximately half way around the world.

A special extra five-year guarantee regarding the streets has been given City authorities by the Warren Faving company. It was reported last night at a regular meeting of the Council attended by all Councillors but Mr. Roy Oudmore, who is out of the city. The business tax, applicable to this city, was given third and final reading at the regular meeting of the City Council last night. There were no dissenting votes when it was read and Mayor Stewart called for the "ayes" and the "nays". Councillor J. Frank Storey also said in answer to questions from the Council that the paving company would pay approximately \$10 per hour for the use of the plant which the city owned for paving purposes. He also said the company found this arrangement considerably cheaper than installing a plant of their own which might cost them up to \$10,000 to erect.

"We strive for uniformity where possible, diversity where necessary," but certainly at all times," said Mr. J. A. MacPhee, president of the Superintendents of Insurance of the Provinces of Canada, as he presided at the annual meeting of the group at the Charlottetown yesterday. Mr. MacPhee explained that the Provincial Superintendents, in conjunction with Federal authorities, were literally a law-making body and their primary function was to bring Provincial laws to a common level if possible, in accord with Federal insurance laws, in order to reduce charges to the people wherever possible. It was on this basis that he explained to the 100 delegates attending the need for providing uniformity of insurance laws in the countries present. The delegates listening to the convention were not members proper as it was primarily a meeting of the ten Superintendents only. However, there were countless members of the various insurance companies of the countries present as they came from all parts of Canada to hear what the top men of the industry had to say.

WEDNESDAY

OHATHAM, N. B. (CP) — The pilot killed Tuesday when a Chatham-based RCAF jet plane crashed on Quebec's Gaspé peninsula was identified Tuesday night as F.O. Stewart Ira Banks, 24, an instructor from Conway Station, P. E. I. He is survived by his widow and three-year-old son. The aircraft hit a mountain top and crashed in flames 12 miles east of Charlottetown. RCAF officials reached the spot soon after the plane was noticed in trouble. The crash occurred near two farms at Maria-Quest.

The pilot was found strapped to his seat 500 feet from the wreckage. FO Banks was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Banks Poplar Grove, near Conway Station. A former student of Prince of Wales College, he joined the R. C. A. F. in March 1948 and received his pilot's wings in January, 1949. After graduation he went to Summerside's Air Navigation School and while there was Air Cadet Liaison Officer for more than a year. He went to Chatham in August, 1950 and in January, 1951 went to the United Kingdom with 421 Red Indian Squadron. Later he returned to Canada and then was posted to France. He came back to Chatham last month.

"No Jurisdiction should under-

Baillie, Commissioner of Taxation of Manitoba, when he addressed the meeting of the Insurance men presided over by the president, Mr. J. A. MacPhee, head of the Superintendents of Insurance of the Provinces of Canada.

Mr. Baillie who happened to be in the Province while the conference was in meeting was approached to address it because of his great experience in this country and in the United States, where he is a speaker of recognized ability and an outstanding authority on the subject of highway safety and security.

Mr. G. W. H. Beers, Assistant Postmaster at Charlottetown who recently retired from the service after being employed at the local office for 38 years, was tendered a farewell banquet by his fellow employees at the Village Restaurant, Southport, on Saturday night.

"More than five million policyholders across the Dominion indicate the life insurance business as the greatest co-operative enterprise in Canada," said Mr. J. A. MacPhee, president of the Superintendents of Insurance of the Provinces of Canada, in his address to members of the Life Underwriters Association of P. E. Island and invited guests at a public relations luncheon in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"In the more than 100 years since the first Canadian life insurance company was formed," Mr. Foster said, "no policyholder in a Canadian legal reserve company has ever lost a dollar through non-payment of the amount guaranteed under his policy at death or maturity."

"As a step towards locating the new North River bridge on a more desirable location and straightening out the turns at North River corner we are laying out a straight line route from the east end of the Cornwall Road to a point in the vicinity of the Upton Experimental Station," said Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways yesterday.

THURSDAY

Relative to the actual operation of the Marketing Agreement between the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board and the Government of Canada now effective, the Potato Board chairman, Mr. D. A. MacDonald, has released the following statement: At a meeting of Board members held on Tuesday last a general plan of administration was approved. The Board chairman has been designated as the Selling Agency by the Board. The administration staff will be secured as soon as possible. The Selling Agency will make arrangements for such licensed dealers, assemblers, and growers as are desirous of marketing through the pool to remain under the agreement throughout the season. The Agency will require authorized agents at all shipping and assembling points in Prince Edward Island; these shall be dealers or assemblers who are licensed by the Potato Marketing Board. It will be the duty of these agents to advise the Selling Agency of potatoes which are available for market in their areas and await instructions from the Selling Agency before potatoes are accepted for market from the grower.

A most successful Queen's County plowing match was held yesterday at Alexandria on the farm of Mr. Samuel Cousins. A large crowd of almost 2,000 was on hand to witness the event, all of which were keenly contested and gave the judges a difficult time in deciding the winner. The match was officially opened at 10 o'clock by the Rev. George Tilley of Pownal, and continued until sundown, with the result that 3 classes, although completed, will not be judged until today. The programme did not lack variety, as there were in addition to the plowing events a 4-ft achievement day, a garden club show, a "farm road" as well as sports, Highland dancing and step dancing. The ladies of Cherry Valley United Church catered to the large crowd by serving meals and lunches. A pipe band under pipe major MacLeod of Charlottetown rendered bag pipe music throughout the day.

"We definitely need electrical power in this province and it is only through the prosperity of the country that the city can survive," said Premier A.W. Matheson in addressing the annual meeting of the Liberal Association of the Fifth District of Queens at the Clover Club last evening. He advised the people of Charlottetown and the Royalty areas to avoid petty matters and to remember that "what we get for the country is a benefit to all." He suggested that farm activities should not be confined to cattle or potato but "everything we can raise for the markets near us in Newfoundland, Sydney and parts of Quebec which we can easily reach." The Premier said he was confident that a wonderful trade to these places can be established.

In the presence of a reverent congregation in Zion Church last evening the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island designated Miss Roma Rodd a Deaconess of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The service of worship was conducted by the acting Moderator of the Presbytery, the Rev. T. H. B. Somers, assisted by the Rev. Leo M. MacNaughton of Marshfield and the Rev. J. N. Young of Montserrat.

The solemn rite of designation

was administered by the Rev. T. H. B. Somers and the address given by the Rev. D. Donald Campbell of New London.

Organization of a civilian ground observer corps in Prince Edward Island, which was started here last fall has now been resumed, F.O. D. L. Gagey, DFC, of No. 70 Detachment Corps at Truro, now on his third recent organizational visit to P. E. I. said yesterday it is expected that the P.E.I. organization would be completed by mid-October.
