POSTAL.—A new post office has been authorized to be opened at Alberry Plains, to be served tri-weekly from Vernon River. Lower Freetown will be served with tri-weekly mails on and after 1st of November, next, superseding the present semi-weekly service.

ROUGH PASSAGE.—The steamer Carroll, at Boston, from Charlottetown and Halifax, reports one of the hardest passages in her experience. The steamer was forced to put back to sea again after reaching Boston light early Monday morning and await an abatement of the gale.

NO WONDER.—At a recent meeting of the Toronto Board of Health, it was shown that during the month of September 284 houses were found without drains, 424 houses with foul privies, and 8 houses with foul wells. There were 221 cases of typhoid fever reported during the month, the largest number in the history of the city.

A DAY OF FATALITIES.—Wednesday last was a day of fatalities in Montreal. An unknown man was knocked over and killed on St. Paul street, and later on a Grand Trunk train ran into a horse and carriage at St. Henri, killing a little girl named Bowdoin, and perhaps fatally wounding a man and boy. Still later, a little girl three years old, named Simpson, was run over and killed by an express wagon.

A CURIOSITY.—This morning we were shown a bride of horse hair, woven by a cowboy of the west while doing a term in prison. It is entirely made by hand and is woven as perfectly as if it were done by machinery. Dr. Duncan, of Glendive, Montana, who is the possessor of it, will leave it at Dodd's Medical Hall, where anybody wishing to see this handiwork of the west, may do so.

Rev. Emory J. Haynes, the well-known Baptist pastor of Tremont Temple, Boston, has resigned at the request of the trustees. The trustees objected to the doctor's course in giving so much of his time to literary work, to his "unclerical behaviour, possessing and driving a span of horses noted for their speed," to his leaning toward Unitarianism, and to his entering into a speculation which nearly bankrupted him.

WHEN THE BODY DIES, THE SOUL DIES ALSO.

Rev. James Thompson, pastor of the Methodist Church at Shelburne, Ont., who was suspended from the ministry by the investigating committee on Monday, has been teaching a peculiar doctrine. At the resurrection, the body and soul appear before the judgment seat of God to be judged according to their merits. All who are believers on earth will have their reward and their souls will live on forever, but the bodies of the wicked who had on earth enjoyed the Gospel advantages will be raised, judged and punished for a time and then annihilated, but such wicked as have not had the Gospel opportunities, will not be raised at all. Mr. Thomson has only been suspended from preaching till the Toronto conference meets and dealing with his case.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.

Lord Aberdeen reached here to-day and was entertained at luncheon by Sir John Thompson, all the Cabinet Ministers in town being present. Lord Aberdeen was interviewed to-day by the representatives of the Home Rule Association, to whom he expressed the strongest hopes of the early success of the cause.

W. D. Dimock, of Truro, has been appointed Superintendent of the Canadian exhibits at the Jamaica Exhibition.

Postmasters have been instructed to notify newspaper offices of any known changes in the addresses of subscribers. They will be furnished blanks for the purpose.

The Customs Department has been notified of the seizure at Montreal of a thousand tons of asphalt for under valuation.

Considerable amusement has been created here by the queries from the States as to the truth of the story circulated that the British Government had supplied \$100,000 to defeat McKinley at the pending election in Ohio.

Preparing a Protest.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.

The Times says a protest against the operation of the McKinley tariff law is being prepared by counsel acting for a large number of the most prominent merchants of this city. The grounds on which the bill will be fought are: 1st, that by the passage of the McKinley Bill the old tariff of 1883 was not repealed; 2nd, that the alleged act entitled, "An act to reduce the revenue and equalize the duties imports and for other purposes" to have been approved on October 1st, 1880, never passed the House of Representatives and Senate; and 3rd, that the bill which did pass the House and Senate had never been presented to the President according to the constitution, and had never been approved and signed by him. Eminent lawyers are said to assert that there are irregularities and omissions in the bill which entirely vitiate it.

New Brunswick Elections.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 23.

The Government have been handsomely sustained in York. It was a square defeat for the Opposition, who were beaten all round the circle, and so emphatically as to demonstrate that the sentiments of the country are in full accord with the Attorney General. With three places to hear from the vote now stands: Blair, 2904; Wilson, 2802; Collier, 2838; Anderson, 2807; Gregory, 2489; McFarlane, 2488; Geo Colter, 2474; Allen, 2452.

Birchall's Life.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., Oct. 23.

Birchall has completed the history of his life. He wants \$2,000 for it, but the largest offer so far is \$1,000. Birchall has not much faith in the appeal to Ottawa for executive clemency, yet he does not grow despondent. With only twenty more days to live, he is as buoyant and cheerful as ever.

Boxing Contest.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 23.

At the Gladstone Club to-night, the boxing contest between Geo. Dixon, the colored lad, and Bantam Wright, champion of the world, and young Johnny Murphy, of Boston, for a \$2,000 purse, and a wager of \$3,000 a side. In the 38th round Murphy's backers threw up the sponge, their man being badly used up. Murphy weighed in 114½ pounds, and Dixon 113.

Again Postponed.

HALIFAX, Oct. 23.

This morning, previous to 9 o'clock, the water on the Basin was smooth, and both crews were out. Between that time and 2 o'clock the wind freshened, rendering the water too lumpy for a race, and it was again postponed.

Bishop Laval Canonized.

QUEBEC, Oct. 23.

Cardinal Taschereau has received a papal decree for canonizing of Mgr. Laval, first Bishop of Quebec.
