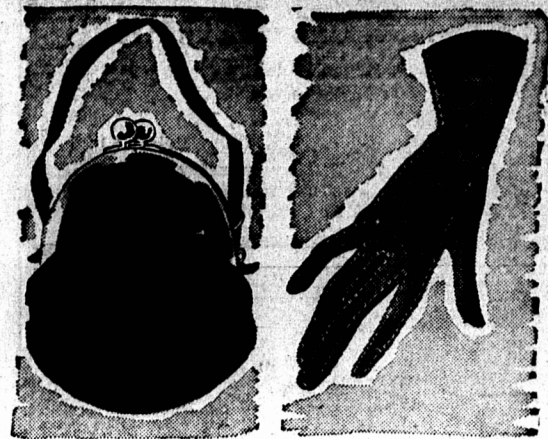
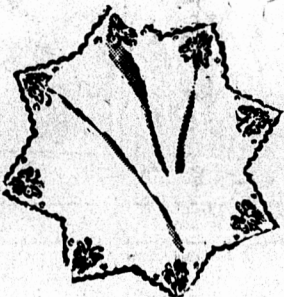

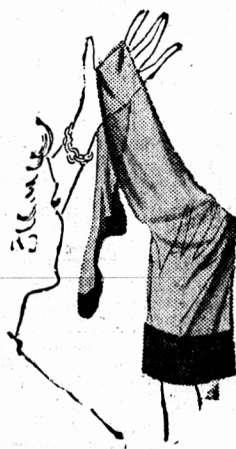

Abbotsley, St. Necks, Hunting-down, England, Jan. 13th.

Dear Mrs. MacEachern or present Secretary:—

Thank you so much for the parcels received on Tuesday the 10th. What a kind thought of all your members. Meat is one of our most rationed foods, we get 1 shilling 6d worth each a week, and when we are able to get these cans of beef they are such a lot of points those that have only one or two books are unable to get them. So I leave you to guess this is a very pleasant gift to all of us. We had 44 members this year, and pay subscriptions this month, we hope to have a few new members. 1949 has been a very successful year for us, our choir gained the Rose Bowl for singing, and the drama group had fourth place at the County Music and Drama Festival. The canning group canned 400 cans of fruit for members, and we have had rug classes, and there have been some lovely rugs made, in February we are hoping to have leather classes, to learn to make our bags and purses. I do hope your W. I. is progressing, and we should be very interested to hear about your work.

I now have to send a very big thank you from every member of our Institute and we all wish

you a very happy and prosperous New Year and great success to your Institute this year.

NEW YORK, March 29 — (AP) — It's twice as safe working with atomic energy as in the average American industrial plant. Merrill Eisenbud, director of the Health and Safety Division of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission's New York office, said today the accident rate in the atomic energy industry is 6.3 per cent for every
