A POINTER.

Mr. R. C. Miller was, until lately, the editor of the Pembroke Observer, a staunch Liberal organ while the Liberals were in opposition. Mr. Miller, it appears, went to the Klondike last year in search of gold. But, as the Montreal Star remarks, he apparently found more scandal and corruption than wealth in that remote region. However this may be, he wrote some letters to his paper. In the course of these letters he said that he was compelled to listen all summer to the most violent railings at the Government and its officials; who were charged with outrageous corruption, that after reaching Dawson he "was forced to acknowledge the truth of the accusations," and he had no hesitation in declaring that if the Government "did not take strong and speedy steps to end the orgie that is in progress here they will not only have become partners in the dirt themselves, but shall have permitted the continuance of a system which must result in very great financial and moral injury to the Dominion." Mr. Miller added:

"That the mining laws are being set aside on a colossal scale is beyond all question, and that bare-faced bribery is the rule of the day is equally certain."

In view of this arraignment, by an editor friendly to the Government, something had to be done. So the acute Minister of the Interior (Mr. Sifton) had the editor appointed mining inspector at a good salary. Herein lies a moral to be applied by other Liberal editors. Let them tell the truth about the Government's actions, and they may be provided for. The policy of "kick" is sometimes a good one for the person who kicks as well as for the country. Witness the case of Mr. Wise who has had a free passage to Great Britain, and has come back loaded with information for the people, as a result of the disquieting letter written to the editor of the Patriot—which letter has not yet appeared!

Morell Notes.

Mr. William Sterns, our aged and respected resident, is at present visiting friends in Halifax and Truro.

We are sorry to hear of the death of Mrs. Sarah McVarish, widow of Joseph McVarish, which occurred recently at Lynn, Mass. Her body will be brought home for interment.

Mr. Nicholas J. Hayes, of New York City, intends visiting the Island in May next to dispose of his property at Morell station, known as the property of the late Richard Hayes.

A very boyish-looking chap called a few mornings ago at the Wayside House, comfortably arranged in a mud box with a bundle of hay and a shovel as though he was one of our sturdy farmer's sons on his way to the muck and mud. He had a heavy job before him to move the digger and cut ice and wanted some refreshments for the occasion, but through the ingenuity of Jack he got nicely left.

Your correspondent had the pleasure of visiting the mussel and bed on Friday and was surprised to see upwards of one hundred and fifty sleighs from all parts of the country around busily engaged raising and landing at different parts along the bay and rivers. This bed is a great boon to the farmers, as there are several acres which do not freeze in winter. A scheme is now on hand to try and provide material to dig within the summer season.

Maories and Whites.

"As instancing the good understanding which now prevails between the Maories and Europeans, I may mention," remarks a New Zealand correspondent, "that both races now enter into friendly competition in trials of strength, and quite recently the Europeans have had to pay second prize to their dusky rivals. In a boat race at Auckland—a native crew again a crew of man-of-war's men—the native crew were the victors, and a Maori team was also successful in a tug-of-war against a team from H. M. S. Taurangi. Lady Gore Brown's visit to New Zealand at the present time reminds me that when her husband was Governor of the colony cannon were mounted and manned on a prominence overlooking the harbor to repel an expected invasion of Auckland by the Maories, who canoe used to swarm by hundreds on the waters of the Waitemata. The prominence has since been levelled, but on the same waters it overlooked the descendants of bygone warriors competed the other day in an aquatic contest, and left the man-of-war's men considerably behind them, and came out victors in a subsequent trial of strength. That shows what only a few years of civilization have done. In the war days the Maories used above all things to dread an attack by the blue jackets, and now they shake hands and 'shake up' each other as though the past had been entirely erased from the face of history."

Organization Meeting

A large and influential meeting took place in Riddell's Hall, Alberton on Thursday the 9th inst. Mr. James P. Cunningham, second Vice President, was called to the chair and the undersigned was appointed Secretary. The President then made a few opening remarks, and called upon Mr. J. Albert Brennan, Convener, who in eloquent and choice phrases explained fully the mode of organization and the methods by which it would be carried forward.

A letter was read from John P. Brennan, Convener of the Riding, regretting that through illness he was unable to be present, also one from H. J. Pino, Bloomfield, regretting his inability to be present.

Mr. Edward Hackett was then called upon, and on rising was received with rounds of applause. He went fully into the nature of organization, and its importance, and from that stitched on to an exhaustive arraignment of the present government.

Speeches were also made by John T. Weeks, Altra Wedge, W. D. White, M. McElroy, and Rev. Blanchard, James E. Birch, Geo. R. Montgomery.

James H. Gavin moved and John T. Weeks seconded the following resolution: Whereas: Sir Charles Tupper, the leader of the great Liberal Conservative Party is already engaged in organization all over Canada; and

Whereas: A party organization has been appointed in Montreal with a view of placing the Conservative party in a perfect state of organization;

Therefore Resolved: That this meeting fully endorse the action of Sir Charles and the Conservative Party in thus taking time by the forelock in preparation for the next contest.

Further Resolved, That this meeting desire to place on record the approval of

the action taken by the late conference of the Liberal Conservative party at Charlottetown by means of which we trust a good and effective organization will be formed throughout this province on the success that is crowning his efforts in the direction of organization.

This resolution was carried unanimously. Mr. Hackett moved and Geo. R. Montgomery seconded the motion that the thanks of this meeting be tendered Mr. Cunningham for his able and efficient conduct in the chair, which was happily acknowledged by the President.

This closed very important and successful meeting inasmuch as we had Mr. Larkin a convert from the army of gritism.
