FOUR DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE "CITY OF BALTIMORE" AT NEWFOUNDLAND.

The steamship City of Baltimore, which sailed from Liverpool on the 23rd May, arrived off Cape Race at noon on the 1st inst.

The House of Lords, in rejecting the Commons Bill for repealing the Duties on paper, had excited much attention. The vote was 193 to 104; majority against the Government.

The Lord Palmerston stated in the Commons that he would move for a Committee to examine for presidents for the course proposed by the Lords, but disclaimed any desire to place the two Houses of Parliament in hostility.

THE WAR IN ITALY.

Official Neapolitan statements, current at the time of the departure of the Arabia, to the effect that Garibaldi's force had been completely routed, are flatly contradicted. The Neapolitan troops were totally defeated near Moriani, and Garibaldi's troops had invested that City, which commands Palermo.

The latest rumors say that Garibaldi had obtained a decided victory at Moriani. The Neapolitan Government has very little to say, but the last bulletin said that two columns of Garibaldi's army were pursuing the dispersed troops.

The insurgents were gaining strength daily. It was vaguely reported that France and Russia had signed a treaty on the 19th, relative to the Eastern question.

CHINA.

A private telegram from China says that the China Government absolutely refuses the ultimatum of England and France, and that war is the only alternative.

UNITED STATES.

Live papers report that a most fearful tornado had been experienced at Louisville on the 22nd May. A telegram from Cincinnati dated on the 23rd, thus notices its extent, and damage done:

Yesterday's storm extended from Louisville to Marietta, following the line of the river. The damage is estimated at \$1,000,000.

All the towns above this place suffered very severely. Thirty-six pairs of coal boats are known to have sunk, involving a loss of over 100 lives.

At Louisville and New Albany the storm was less disastrous than in this vicinity, although in these places a great many buildings were unroofed, and trees and fences prostrated.

RECIPROCITY TREATY.

The following extract contains the latest doings in congress in reference to this subject. "In the House of Representatives, when the Tariff Bill was before the house, Mr. Foster, of Maine, moved an amendment to the effect that the Reciprocity Treaty be terminated. The motion was lost by a large majority."
