THE ENGLISH REFORMATION.

The Rev. Canon Brock, D. D., Rector of Kentville, N. S., preached a sermon on Sunday evening last in St. Paul's Church, in this city, on the above subject. He has been strongly urged by many members of St. Paul's Church to publish this sermon, in full. He prefers, however, not to do this, but has been good enough to furnish us with the following analysis of the sermon which brings out the principal points:

Jer., 6-16— "Thus saith the Lord, Stand ye in the ways and see, and ask for the good way, and walk therein and ye shall find rest for your souls."

Our English Reformation, its Nature and its Blessings is the subject before us.

ITS NATURE.

1. It was a work of time. Our English Reformation was not the work of one mind, one generation or even one century.

Wickliffe and Wolsley, Cranmer and Parker, Whitgift and Cosins, men of very different minds, all had their share in this great work.

Wickliffe may be called its "Morning Star." His great work was the translation of the Bible into the English language; though it is to be remembered that during the middle ages every person who could read, could without difficulty procure those parts of the Bible which were read in the Church services. But to Wickliffe England owes its first translation of the whole Bible into English, and the foundation of our present authorized version.

The preacher then referred to the Magna Charta, the work of the patriotic Archbishop Langton, to the legislation of the English Parliament in the 14th century, which prepared the nation for the Reformation in the 16th century, to the orderly ecclesiastical work of the great Cardinal Wolsley who broke up the medieval system in England, and to the successive and gradual steps the Reformation of the Church of England, carried out by her own bishops and divines in the reigns of Henry 8, Edward 6, Elizabeth, James 1 and Charles 2, as illustrating the first point that the English Reformation was a work of time.

2. It was a work of restoration. It was restoration not destruction, reformation not revolution, that the English reformers aimed at and carried out. Their declared design was not to found a new Church, but to restore what was most ancient and adifying in the ancient Church of Christ.

Hence they retained the three orders of Bishops, Priests and Deacons which had existed from the times of Christ's Apostles; hence, they preserved the unbroken succession of the Apostolical Episcopate; hence, they retained the ancient Creeds of the Holy Catholic Church; hence, in the compilation of our Book of Common Prayer, while using to some extent the existing service books of the Church, they borrowed largely from the ancient Liturgies of the early Church.

All this shows that what our Reformers did in England was not to found a new Church, but to restore and purify the old one; to bring the Church back to "the old paths" of St. Alban, St. Augustine, St. Aidan, St. Cuthbert, St. Hilda, Bede, and King Alfred.

The Reformation was not the beginning of the Church in Britain: For its first beginning we must look back to the first or second Christian century, when Missionaries from Gaul first visited the shores of the Britain of the Druids; or when Christian soldiers came in the train of the armies of Imperial Rome to establish or consolidate the power of the Empire in the Province of Roman Britain.

For its second beginning, after the Teuton invasion had swept over the land, we must look to St. Augustine, sent by Gregory the Great, and still more to St. Aidan, and his large band of devoted fellow-laborers who came from Iona in the Western Hebrides.

3. The preacher then, in the third place, proceeded at some length to show that the Reformation of the Church of England was not a work of schism.

The second part of the sermon was occupied with

THE BLESSINGS OF THE ENGLISH REFORMATION.

The preacher referred to following blessings—

1. The Reformation delivered the English Church and nation from the authority and control of the Bishop of Rome.

2. It emancipated the English people from mental thralldom, producing ultimately Liberty of the Press, of Worship, and of Education.

3. It purified our worship, several instances were given.

4. It restored the full, free, and pure Gospel of the Lord Jesus. This was illustrated fully.

5. It re-established the Supremacy of Holy Scripture.

At the conclusion of Sermon, of nearly forty minutes, which was listened to with unflinching attention, the preacher urged the congregation to study carefully the principles of the Church of England, and with this end in view he recommended them to procure and to read thoughtfully "Little's Reasons for being a Churchman." The preacher concluded by reminding his audience that the Church of England was Catholic for every truth of God, and Protestant against every error of man.
