CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Estimates Adopted—Rates of Taxation Fixed

A special meeting of the City Council was held yesterday afternoon to take up the estimates for the year and the assessment by laws, and to consider the advisability of obtaining authority to issue debentures for permanent improvements. Mayor Warburton presided, and every member of the Board was present.

Before proceeding with the business of the meeting Mayor Warburton expressed the pleasure it gave him to have Councillor Lyons at the Board again, and hoped that he would continue to improve. Councillor Wear then submitted the estimates for the year, which are as follows:—

The estimates were first taken up item by item, and adopted, after which they were passed as a whole.

Under the heading of City Government there is an increase of \$200 in the salary of the City Clerk, putting it up to \$1400; and under City Building there is an item of \$350 for plumbing.

Councillor Wear then submitted the bylaws regulating the rates of assessment for general civic and waterworks purposes, which were read a first and second time and set down for third reading at a meeting to be held on Monday.

The rate of assessment for general civic purposes was fixed at 1 per cent. on real estate and 1/2 per cent. on personal property. The rate for waterworks purposes was placed at 1/2 per cent. on real estate and personal property and 10c on each poll. The usual by-law specifying a rate of discount was also advanced to second reading. The rate is 2 1/2 per cent. on taxes paid on or before the 15th July.

Councillor Tanton presided while the Council was in committee on the second reading of the bylaws.

Six o'clock having arrived by the time the bylaws were disposed of consideration of the debentures matter was deferred until the regular meeting of Council.
