STALLION ENROLMENT

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded and carry an inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

The required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) should be enclosed with each application for enrolment and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour description and registration number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled or inspected, or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.

ATTENTION

POTATO GROWERS and OPERATORS of POTATO MACHINERY.

All potato growers and operators of potato machinery are reminded of the amendment to the "Plant Disease Eradication Act" which has reference to the disinfecting of potato machinery and the registering annually of operators of such such machines.

Under the provisions of the above-mentioned Act, all potato Planters, Set Cutters, and other equipment used in the handling of potatoes on more than one farm or for custom work, must be thoroughly disinfected before being used on another farm and in the presence of the farmer or person who requires its use on such farm.

The steam cleaning and disinfecting service will again be available this year to the operators of potato machinery.

All farmers, or others, who operate Potato Planters, Set Cutter, and other equipment used in the handling of potatoes on more than their own farms, must apply immediately to the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Box 2000, Charlottetown, for a license and enclose the license fee of fifty cents (\$0.50). When application for a license is received, a record book will be forwarded to the operator and the receipt of the record book will be evidence that the operator has registered.

Diver Finds Instruments

Are Removed

NEW YORK (AP)—A diver hired by the Israeli shipping line Zim to recover navigation instruments from a sunken Norwegian tanker discovered they had already been removed, from the ship, the New York Times reports.

The tanker, the Stolt Dagali, and the Israeli liner Shalom collided off the coast of New Jersey last November and the tanker sank with the loss of 19 lives. The Times said the Israeli line hired a diver to recover instruments from the bulk 240 feet down on the ocean floor for evidence in \$5,000,000 worth of court suits.

The Times says the diver found a neat hole had been cut into the side of the tanker and the instruments had been taken. The wreckage of the tanker is in international waters.

Yank-Russian Reunion Dropped

BERLIN (AP)—A reunion of American and Russian Second World War veterans who met 20 years ago at the head of their victorious armies has been called off, an East German source said here.

He said the cancellation "may be due to U.S. involvement in the Viet Nam war." Veterans of both the U.S. and Red armies were to celebrate the occasion Sunday at Torzan, a town 42 miles south of Berlin and deep inside East Germany, restored to almost full use.

CIL Sales Up

Five Per Cent

MONTREAL (CP) - Consolidated sales of Canadian Industries Ltd and its subsidiaries for the first quarter of 1965 were five per cent higher than the same period last year, said Leonard Hynes, CIL president, at the company's annual meeting here.
