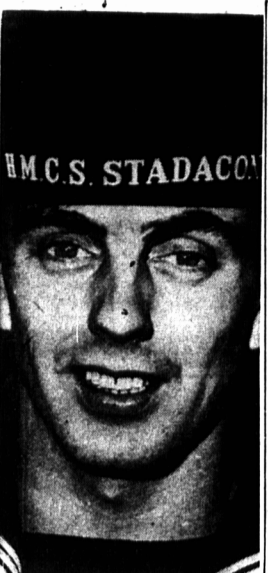

Thoughts For Our Time

TOTAL SELF-GIVING DOESN'T BAR PLEASURE

There are two questions which sincere Christians may sometime ask themselves. "How often do I have to worship God?" "How much pleasure may I legitimately have from life?" I am afraid that what they really mean is: "How may I ignore God, and seek other things?"

If I am right, then idolatry is not dead, for the first Commandment forbids cravings for money, comforts, and pleasures for their own sakes just as much as it forbids worship of stone idols. The fact is that we may perform no action whatsoever which is not for God.

Does this mean that we must force ourselves constantly to think directly of God and of what may serve Him, before we perform each action?

Perhaps an analogy will help us here. Does a devoted wife have to think directly of her husband and of what will benefit him, before every action? Of course not! There is no artificial forcing. Everything is natural and spontaneous. Her love for him is simply there, like a generous spring, and all the little day-to-day actions which she performs for his sake are the waters that flow spontaneously from this spring.

So should be our love of God, and all the day-to-day activities to which it gives rise. Our love for God should not be something forced, or worse, feigned, which is worn like a Sunday coat, only on rare occasions. Rather, every instant of our lives, and everything we do should be bathed in its light.

The comparison made here between the relation of God to his people and the relation of husband to wife, is by no means original. It was made long ago by St. Paul.

Thoughts For Our Time

TOTAL SELF-GIVING DOESN'T BAR PLEASURE

Could it be any less certain that a life devoted to the love and worship of God is incomplete if this love and worship is expressed only in an indirect fashion? Surely not. Even if it be true that "whether we eat or drink, or whatsoever else we do, we do all to the glory of God," if we stop here, our lives are incomplete. There must be times when we set aside creatures and give our direct attention solely to Him in acts of love and worship.

Such acts will express most perfectly our love, and foster it most effectually. Direct worship of God should be made often; otherwise there is little chance of our day-to-day lives being bathed in love for Him, as they should be. Not a day should be allowed to pass when we have not at least breathed a few short prayers to Him.

A common and laudable practice is to speak to Him the first thing in the morning, and the last thing in the evening. Our social worship of God, though necessarily less frequent, should not be neglected either. The once-a-week prescribed by God for the Jews has been fittingly retained by Christians.

How often, then, do I have to worship God? By indirect means always and continuously - there is not an instant that should not be at least an indirect expression of our love of Him. In a direct way, not continuously, yet often, at least twice daily.

As can easily be seen, in order to satisfy to answer the two questions posed earlier, it has been necessary to approach them in a wholly new way. The person asking them would usually have a somewhat negative attitude toward religion and morality (whether he realized it or not), and to this extent he will be an idolater. He can understand the answers only if he takes a more positive attitude toward these things, and to that extent he will be more truly a Christian.

TOTAL SELF-GIVING
 Such a total self-giving by no means takes away the pleasures of life. How could there be love without pleasure? All the pleasures of married life are there for the express purpose of fostering material love, and the aims to which it is directed.

In the same way, all life's pleasures, without exception, are there for the express purpose of fostering the creature's love for God, and of bringing him closer to the goal of his existence. St. Paul said: "Whether you eat or drink, or whatsoever else you do, do all to the glory of God."

How much pleasure, then, may I legitimately have from life? The answer is: an indefinite amount - so long as it is taken as a means of coming closer to God, and not simply as an end in itself.

Again, the completeness of marital life ordinarily demands that love express itself, not only indirectly, by favors, sacrifices, and the like, but also directly, so that at times the person loved is the sole object of attention. Direct acts of love express love most perfectly, and they foster it most effectually.

Huge Wolf Is Reported

SUDBURY, Ont. (CP) - District hunters report a wolf, three feet high at the shoulder, about eight feet long and as fast as a leopard, is stalking the trails around Lake Penace, 30 miles southeast of here.

Andy Tyson, veteran hunter with 400 wolf kills to his credit, said he spotted the creature last Friday from an airplane. He said it was with a white mate and running across the ice of the lake. The pilot landed his aircraft and taxied after the wolves.

"I crippled the white wolf - the first white one I've ever hit - but my shotgun blast didn't seem to trouble the giant," Tyson said. "He kept on going and his speed was amazing."

Camp operator William Gemmell said he spotted the big wolf a week ago but could not get in his jeep although the vehicle was going as fast as it could over the lusher ice.

Gemmell gave dimensions of the animal and said its pad marks were as big as saucers.
