BADOGLIO TO RE-ORGANIZE ITALY'S FORCES

ROME, June 11—Marshall Pietro Badoglio, 63-year-old grizzled veteran of the Great War and "conqueror of Ethiopia," was entrusted with another big task today—that of reorganizing all of Italy's defence forces.

Premier Mussolini returned Badoglio to his former duties as Chief of the Italian General Staff, Badoglio resigning as Viceroy of Ethiopia.

Military sources said Badoglio would reorganize all military forces, including the army, navy and the air force.

Marshall Rodolfo Graziani, "Wolf of the South," was named Viceroy of Ethiopia succeeding Badoglio and will continue in control there. He commanded Italy's southern army in the war against King Victor Emmanuel honored Badoglio by creating for him a new title—"Duke of Addis Ababa." It Duce told Badoglio the King had decided on this further recognition without the suggestion of any one.

ELECTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT TABLED

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 11—Having studied proportional representation and the alternative vote in single-member constituencies, the Commons committee reviewing the Franchise and Elections Act reported today against both of these systems. C. E. Bothwell (Lib. Swift Current) committee chairman, presented the report to the House this afternoon.

A number of questions had been referred to the committee but on these the conclusion was reached that further study was necessary. The committee recommended that "further investigation is necessary before reporting to Parliament" on compulsory registration of voters and compulsory voting. It is urged that the committee be established next session with this end in view.

The committee shelved the problem of disfranchised Canadian-born Japanese in British Columbia. On this point the report said: "During the course of its deliberations your committee heard four witnesses from British Columbia asking that the franchise be extended to Canadian citizens of Japanese origin. The brief filed by them is attached hereto and opens up a subject of wide and far-reaching importance on which much further evidence will have to be obtained before your committee could make any finding with respect to the request made."

Methods of effecting redistribution could not be effectively considered during the session. The committee reported, and it was recommended that this be held over until next session.

The committee paid tribute to the energy and assistance received from Harry Butcher who had conducted an "exhaustive and unbiased inquiry" into the subjects studied by the committee.

HALT CIVILIAN TRAFFIC ON RAILWAY

(C.P. Havas, By Guardian's Special Wire) SHANGHAI, June 12—(Friday)—Nanking authorities today halted civilian traffic on the strategic Canton-Hankow railway as Canton troops were reported driving a three-point wedge northward into Nanking-controlled Kiangsi Fukien and Hunan provinces.

One division of Kwangtung province troops was reported joining the Kwangsi army already on the march in Hunan. Another Canton army was said to be driving across the northern Kwangtung border toward Chingwu, in Kiangsi, while a third army corps under General Chang Suikwei was reported en route to Fukien, the coastal province northeast of Kwangtung.

Informed quarters said Nanking's Premier-Dictator, General Chiang Kai-Shek would order no resistance in Hunan until the southerners had passed Henkchow, located in the centre of the province.

Three squadrons of Nanking planes have arrived in Hankow, it was reported, and two others have already left that central city for Changsha.

MANAGED CURRENCY FOR CANADA

Finance Minister Dunning Definitely Against a Policy of Inflation.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 11—Finance Minister Dunning came out definitely today against a policy of deflation, now that Canada will have a managed currency through government control of the Bank of Canada.

He made his announcement in the House of Commons but refused several times to divulge the exact monetary policy the government will follow when it obtains control of the bank. It would defeat the government's objective to divulge it in advance, he said.

Reading slowly and emphatically from a prepared statement, the Finance Minister said: "Any suggestion that a deflation policy is being pursued is incorrect and any suggestion that a policy of deflation should be pursued is contrary to common sense." At the same time he hoped his announcement would not be taken to mean that Canada was in for a policy of currency inflation.

Side-steps Issue

Several times the Finance Minister was asked to define the government's currency policy in relation to the bank but each time he side-stepped. Hon. H. Stevens (Recon. East Kootenay) suggested it was too important that a private session of the House should be held to discuss it but again the Finance Minister declined.

If, said Mr. Dunning, he announced currency was to be expanded and the price level raised, stock speculation would start. Other financial factors would be loosened which might retard the government's policy, if not defeat it. It would be worse than a budget leak to disclose the government's hand as Washington discovered once or twice.

Central Bank's Duty

A managed currency is so fickle that conditions change from day to day, the minister continued. It was a central bank's duty to apply brakes during a boom and expand currency during a depression but a general policy could not be dogmatized because so many factors were involved.

Mr. Dunning could not agree with the Reconstruction leader and Conservative leader Bennett the bank should increase its gold deposits. In his judgment they were adequate and it was advantageous to export gold at present.

The Conservative leader came out against bilingual currency bills printed in French and English as provided under the legislation.

He said he saw no reason for thrusting a vexed question into the whirlpool of politics at a critical time.

Banks Scale Down Lending Rates

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, June 11—Banks have scaled down the lending rates to commercial borrowers by about one-half of one per cent since the latest cut was made in the interest on deposits at the beginning of this month. Commercial borrowers in Eastern Canada, it is announced, are now paying five to six per cent compared with rates ranging from six to seven per cent three years ago. The Western Canada rates are now running 5 to 6 1-2 per cent compared with 6 to 7 1-2.

Besides commercial paper the reductions are effective for farmers' and brokers' loans as well as municipal and customers' loans against securities. No rates apply however and individual cases are treated on their merits.

Edith Quier Wins U. S. Golf Title

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WILCHESTER, Mass., June 10—Edith Quier of Reading, Pa., became the eastern women's golf champion of the United States today.

Her only outstanding rival in the 54-hole tourney, Mrs. Frances Williams Lack of Wilmington, Del., the 1930 winner, was trapped twice in the final hole. The new title's winning total was 243, two strokes under the runner-up.

Retired B.C. Justice Dies

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) VICTORIA, June 11—Death early today brought to a close the active life of Hon. Francis Brooke Gregory, 74, who retired three years ago from the Supreme Court of British Columbia after 23 years on the bench.

Mr. Gregory served on the British Columbia bench from 1909. In 1933 he retired on superannuation. Born in Fredericton in 1863, he was the son of Mr. Justice G. F. Gregory of New Brunswick. He is survived by his widow and two sons. Two sisters, Miss Edith Gregory and Mrs. H. V. B. Bridges, live in New Brunswick.

Probe Into Wheat Marketing Urged

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 11—A royal commission will investigate wheat marketing if the recommendation submitted to the House today by the special committee on the subject is accepted by the government. Trade Minister Euler was chairman of the committee and two other ministers, Hon. James Gardiner and Hon. T. A. Crerar, served on it, so there is little doubt its unanimous recommendation will be carried out.
