Luncheon Committee for the next meeting is Mrs. Ray Ford, Mrs. Irving Parsons and Mrs. Walter Roberts.

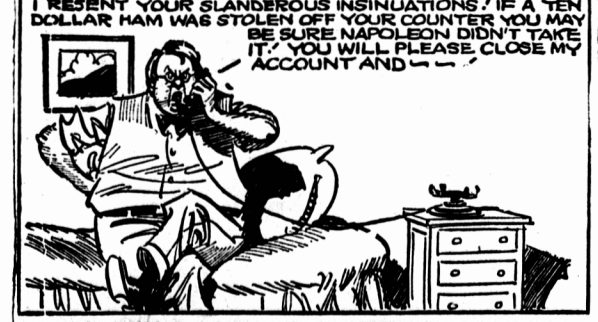
Programme Committee is Mrs. Walter Roberts. The next meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. James Cudmore.
