## Steel Price Increase Seen Likely In U.S. Before '65

CLEVELAND (AP) - Major  
producers are virtually unani-  
mous in saying there should be  
an increase in steel prices and  
odds favor selective increases  
before the end of the year, Stee-  
l Magazine says.

The Metal - Working Weekly  
The steel industry's edition this  
week says that prices have risen  
and are not getting enough  
money for their steel.

The Trade Journal says un-  
precedented competition would  
drive prices on such products as  
welding pipes and machinery  
wire, but it would prevent ex-  
cessive increases in other areas.

Imports of sheets, plates and  
bars have risen sharply this  
year, but not enough to prevent  
domestic producers from in-  
creasing their prices. Steel  
Magazine says.

It adds that imports of all  
products are running ahead of  
last year's record pace, totaling  
2,600,000 tons through July  
for an increase of 22 per cent  
compared with the first seven  
months of 1963.

Steel-makers booked new orders  
at a fast pace last week,  
but their shipments declined as  
a result of the strike against  
General Motors Corp., Steel  
Magazine says.

The pace of U.S. steel produc-  
tion continues to increase, with  
the output this week expected to  
be slightly higher than the  
estimated 2,600,000 tons pro-  
duced last week, the magazine  
reports.

Steel's price composite on the  
No. 1 heavy melting grade of  
steel - making scrap was un-  
changed at \$56.50 a gross ton  
with the price composite on fin-  
ished steel also unchanged at  
\$151.30 a net ton.

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## Canadian Traders Ponder Effect of Labor Victory

The decisive right win by  
the Labor party in Britain's  
general election overshadowed  
last week's other major inter-  
national developments in the  
minds of many Canadian busi-  
nessmen, especially those con-  
nected with overseas trade.

The prime minister, Har-  
old Wilson, the well known in  
Canada's business community  
for his views on cutting Brit-  
ain's long-standing trade deficit  
with Canada.

Now many traders here have  
started wondering what will be  
done about trying to put action  
to his past words when he finds  
time to get around to the prob-  
lem?

From Britain's viewpoint, the  
deficit is serious and showing  
signs of getting worse. Last  
year Canada exported \$100  
\$28,000 worth of goods to Brit-  
ain, while importing \$55,840,  
000.

In the first four months of  
this year Canadian exports  
were \$34,700,000 and imports  
were \$17,200,000. In the com-  
parable 1963 period, exports  
were \$27,000,000 and imports  
\$18,100,000. The provincial com-  
parative increase in exports  
this year.

**WAIT AND SEE**  
General reaction to news of  
Premier Khrushchev's ouster  
and the detonating of a nuclear  
device by Communist China  
was one of wait and see.

At home, the automotive in-  
dustry stood firm and centre  
Quebec's General Investment  
Corporation, a private company  
created by the provincial gov-  
ernment to encourage indus-  
trial enterprise, said it will  
build a \$25,000 factory to as-  
semble under licence 8,000 Ren-  
ault and Peugeot cars a year.

With promise to start later  
next year, the deal was made  
possible by federal tariff re-  
missions granted by the corpora-  
tion for imported parts and ac-  
cessories.

About 250 persons will be em-  
ployed in the plant, expected to  
be located near Montreal.

U.S. Ambassador Adlai E.  
Stevenson said "while no one  
has yet proposed postponement  
of the general assembly, in  
view of recent developments,  
the United States is open  
minded."
