Farm Hazards Studied By New Glasgow Jr. Farmers

The New Glasgow and Districts Junior Farmers met in New Glasgow School Jan. 29, with 24 members present.

The Education Chairman Elbert Orr introduced the guest speaker, Mrs. Harry Cudmore of the Provincial Red Cross, who outlined the Farm Safety Program. Mrs. Cudmore made a few brief remarks and proceeded to show some films of interest.

The first was a sing song film "Sing with the Commendors." The group joined in singing. The second film was "Fire on the Farm" and presented how to prevent fires, how to call fire department and how to fight the fire, and showed the importance of fire insurance.

Mrs. Cudmore made some remarks on the temperature at which hay becomes dangerous. At 160 degrees it is time to do something about it and at 175 degrees it is combustible.

FIRE FIGHTING
The third film was "Fight that Fire." This film showed the different types of extinguishers for individual types of fires. It stressed the importance of making oneself familiar with the instructions on various fire extinguishers at hand.

It showed the position at which to hold the extinguisher until ready to apply to the fire. The extinguisher should be removed from the wall by grasping the top of the machine upright. When within several feet of the fire invert the extinguisher holding the hose firm in the right hand and point the nozzle at the flame.
