even if it takes weeks or months."

Sorrow was mixed with anger in this coal mining village of 5,000 and throughout Britain. There were demands for a full-scale investigation and removal of the coal tips — man-made mountains of refuse from pits, built up over the years in the Welsh coal mining countryside.

Prayers were offered Sunday in churches all along the valley for the victims and their relatives.

Lord Robens, chairman of the National Coal Board, told a news conference that an intensive inspection of all coal board pits in south Wales — estimated to number at least 500 — is in progress. He expressed hope the information obtained would form part of a report which Cledwyn Hughes, secretary for Wales, is to make in the Commons today.

A statement from the Downing Street office of Prime Minister Wilson said Lord Justice Edmund Davies, a Welshman, will head the government inquiry into the Aberfan disaster. Davies, 60, was born only six miles from Aberfan.

The scenes the diggers found in the school were poignant: —Deputy headmaster David Beynon, clutching in his arms five young children, apparently trying to protect them — all dead.

—Fifteen children sitting at their desks, their heads cradled low in their arms — all dead.

—A woman teacher with four children sitting around a table as if frozen at their lessons — all dead.

## University Association Ends 3 Day Convention

About eighty delegates from eighteen Maritime Universities, Colleges, and Technical Institutions finished their three day convention of the Association of Atlantic Students yesterday afternoon at St. Dunstan's University.

Almost every aspect of Students' Union activities were considered by the gathering and several Unions were mandated to make studies on specific programs.

Topics which received special consideration were universal accessibility (free tuition for those students who are academically qualified); student representation on University administrations; Student Council organization; campus police; inter- varsity entertainment circuit; yearbooks; field secretary (full time employee to assist councils with organization and finance); and provincial organizations.

Asked to comment on the conference, Charley McMillan, president of the Students' Union, noted that this fall congress provided the student leaders of the various participating universities to discuss specific problems, and to share information on solutions to these problems.

**DIFFICULTIES** "It seems," he said, "that most councils are experiencing financial difficulties, of one sort or another. Our delegation found that our methods of meeting these problems were not unlike the other colleges, but we received additional tips which should benefit us in the long run."

A subject of great discussion and controversy was the relation of the various councils to AAS and to CUS. St. Dunstan's is holding a referendum Thursday to decide the fate of membership in the Canadian Union of Students. A public forum Wednesday night will provide the proponents of both sides of the question to debate the merit of membership before the student body.

Down from Ottawa were two members of the CUS Secretariat to meet with the delegations. Doug Ward, national President.

school levels. One must be geared to the standards and requirements of the other. The education of our youth must not be sacrificed for a lack of funds."

**MORE FOR EDUCATION** — Prince Edward Island will be seeking higher unconditional grants for education, in addition to increased equalization payments, it was learned from the premier.

"This provincial government has now been in office for the short space of about three months, during which time we have managed to implement several new programs; however, the financial position of the province is not as bright as it was represented to be by the previous administration, and it would be extremely reckless for us as a government to enter into further and expansive new programs without first determining where the money is coming from. Provincial taxes are already too heavy a burden to the Island tax payers and I am confident that they, with the government, share the belief that our provincial finances must be placed upon a sound and firm foundation."

**PREMIER CONFIDENT** — Premier Campbell expressed confidence that further recognition would be received in Ottawa this week of the special fiscal needs of the province. "We have worked hard in preparing a sound case for additional financial grants based, not on charity, but in statistics and facts," the premier said. He added that, "Prince Edward Island presents a special case — one whose reasonable fiscal needs cannot be met by a national formula."

The premier will be accompanied by Provincial Treasurer Hon. T. Earl Hickey, the Minister of Education, Hon. Gordon L. Bennett, Deputy Provincial Treasurer Douglas Dennis, and William Massey, co-ordinator of federal provincial fiscal relations. They will be joined in Ottawa by Stewart Wells, a Montreal economist, formerly from Alberton, P.E.I., who has been working with provincial officials on federal-provincial fiscal arrangements.
