Evans, vice president of the Ministerial Association expressed the hope that the initial meetings in Charlottetown would inaugurate a great spiritual revival from coast to coast as the evangelists followed through with the programme of meetings laid down.

Ibbott, followed by "God Save the Queen." More than 800 persons were present in Zion Presbyterian Church at 8 p.m. when the Army Evangelists opened their first meeting in a series of ten already arranged for, with others throughout the country when possible.

Rev. G. Carlyle Webster extended a hearty and sincere welcome to the Evangelists, expressing the hope that their visit to the city and tour of Canada would be fruitful in the field of their endeavour. Mrs. Major Pedlar gave a short but interesting talk on China and Christian conditions there, followed by a solo, "The Love of God to Me", which was sung by Lieut. Southern Kings Teachers Conclude Conference

The Southern King's school teachers concluded their two-day fall convention at Uigg yesterday, and the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Jack Hughes; vice president, J. B. Scully; secretary, James McConnell.

Dr. L. W. Shaw gave the chief address of the second day's activities. He spoke on the teaching of science, which, he said, is the same subject for all grades but on different levels, fashioned to suit the mental development of students in each grade. Teachers should not go too deeply into the subject in the early grades. He spoke of his attendance at an educational convention in Europe where 51 nations were represented. The unanimous opinion of the delegates was that there must be a change of emphasis in the goal of science. It should be shaped towards better citizenship, rather than the destruction of potential enemies.

Mr. R. Muford, music instructor in P. W. C., told of a music convention which he attended at Amherst. He said that he had not had a favorable report on the progress of music on P. E. I. to present, after hearing the reports from delegates from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. He felt that there was not importance attached to the subject in the normal school, but that interest was being awakened here, and progress in the future might be expected. He announced that a course of studies for music was being worked out for the Island teachers and would be ready for use next year.

Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie explained the changes in the new course of studies, stressing the importance of teachers studying the course. A discussion period followed with Mr. MacKenzie dealing with several questions pertaining to the curriculum.

Miss Mona Clay, of the department of Health and Welfare, gave a very interesting address on mental health among school children. She reminded teachers that they should watch carefully the individual differences in pupils, and to be careful not to increase their emotional disturbance by faulty methods of teaching.

Miss Marie Bowness gave a report on the activities of the Red Cross and plans for the coming year. Mrs. Willard MacKay, who conducts an art class at Vernon school, gave a very instructive talk on her work emphasizing the need for children to have some mode of free expression in creative thinking, and she felt that this was developed in an excellent manner through the medium of painting. A question box was conducted with Dr. Shaw answering many questions pertaining to the department and certain subjects.

Included in the resolutions were the following: Resolutions of thanks to the Uigg School Board and the Women's Institute. Resolutions of thanks to the various speakers. Resolved that the course of studies be placed in the hands of the school secretaries in order that teachers might procure same for study before the opening of the school term.

Whereas it has been established that some dishonesty enters into the preparation of projects in grade 10, therefore be it resolved that the preparation of such projects for examination purposes be discontinued. Whereas there seems to be a feeling among a number of teachers present that it would be desirable to have a great improvement in text books and curriculum in general, be it resolved that we express our appreciation of the untiring efforts of the members of the Department of Education and any others responsible for these improvements.

Resolved that this convention extend its congratulations to Dr. L. W. Shaw on his having been chosen to represent Canada at the world conference on education held in Geneva during July this year. Dr. Shaw's appointment as the sole representative from Canada is indeed a signal honour not only to himself but also to the province as a whole.
