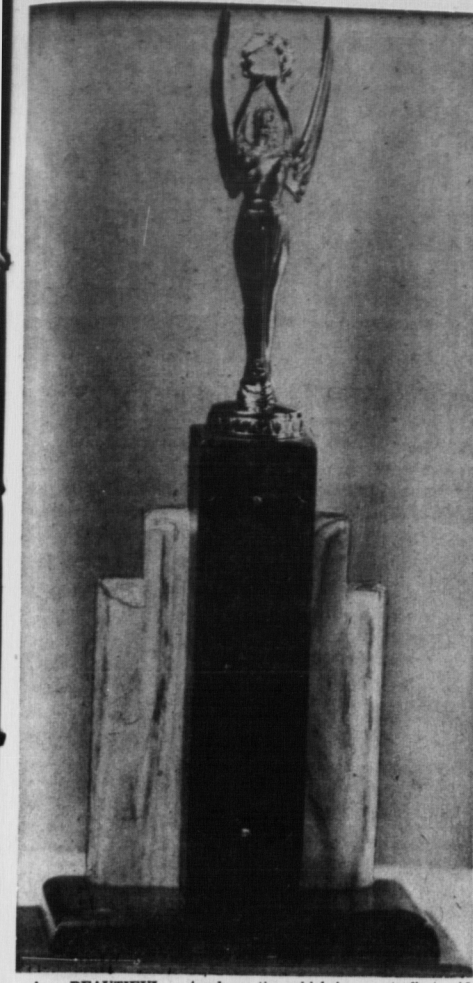

First Aid Teams To Compete In Red Cross Sponsored Rally

A giant province-wide Red Cross first aid rally and competition which may see the winning first aid team compete in an international competition in Montreal is planned for Parkdale School on Saturday. Sinclair Cutcliffe, who will be chief judge of the competition said yesterday, nine teams are sure starters in the competition and three more are likely to take part. More definite word on these will be available later this week. This is the first competition of its kind held on the Island. It is a provincial rally and it is hoped that between 200 and 300 persons will attend, either as contestants or spectators.

The winning team will go to the Craswell Trophy, donated by Cleve Craswell, and, it is hoped, a trip to the International Rescue and First Aid Competition scheduled for Montreal Aug. 24. This would mark the first time the Island would be represented in this competition. Parkdale, Canoe Cove and Central Bedque each have two central entries in the competition. Charlottetown, Kingsboro and Mount Stewart have one team entered and three others are indefinite. Mrs. Evelyn Cudmore is chairman of the event while Mr. Cutcliffe, is co-chairman and chief judge. Those eligible to attend the rally are first aid instructors, first aid post attendants, first aid committees, first aid competition teams and disaster committee personnel. The day's activities get underway Saturday morning at Red Cross Headquarters with a two-hour refresher training course for instructors and first aid attendants. After lunch the scene switches to Parkdale School for the competition for the Craswell Trophy. This will last until 4 p.m. and a workshop will be held between 4 and 5 with special speakers. A dinner at Parkdale Hall will follow at which winning teams will be presented their awards. Special prizes will be given to the top five teams.

Lobster Catches Said 'Promising'

The story was about the same from lobster fishermen in the eastern section of the province last night as each reported that catches were "light but promising." It is believed that the main reason catches are so light is due to the cold water but fishermen are of the opinion that as soon as the water gets warmer the lobsters will be more plentiful. One Amundale fisherman hauled in 600 pounds of lobsters from 302 traps. The majority of fishermen at Morell spent the day setting traps but of two boats that did go out one reaped 700 pounds from 300-400 traps while the other got 175 pounds from 250 traps. Fishermen at North Lake and Naufrage were also putting out traps yesterday. The Eastern Packing Company at Souris expects to start processing the first lobsters today.

Reports from Montague indicate that the lobsters are selling for 60 cents a pound boiled. It is expected that fishermen from Murray Harbor will likely make their first run of the season today. The first lobsters are expected in Charlottetown retail stores this morning but no price has yet been set. Prices were expected to be high because of the light catches. One speculative estimate put the first price as high as \$1 per pound in the city. While ideal conditions prevailed in the South Kings fishing grounds, western lobster fishermen are facing a grim situation with ice jamming the shore. No traps were reported having been laid in this area yet and it was reported that unless there is a change of wind it may be as much as a week before the season can get underway.
