A man named Jenkins, who is also called Professor, and the Canadian Blondin, crossed the gorge below Niagara Falls on a tight rope on Thursday, using a machine of his own invention which looked something like a velocipede. It is a bicycle, with wheels three inches wide, grooved one and three-quarters of an inch deep, and made heavy and of wood. The two-inch hemp cable was fastened immovably on the American shore, but on the Canada shore coiled around a windlass. The man appeared at 2-30 p. m., and, mounting his machine, moved slowly forward, the rope swaying gently from side to side until the rider had passed out about fifty feet, when he was photographed, after which he crawled along at a snail's pace to the middle of the abyss, where he raised and waved his hat. From the centre to the American shore it was evidently hard to propel the bicycle. The time occupied in passing over the rope was just eleven minutes. The crowd of sight-seers was very small, and the receipts were only \$350, while the expenses were \$1000. This apathy on the part of the public is very unexpected, but is highly gratifying.

Reports have been sometime in circulation, and continue to be spread with increasing assurance of negotiations between Prussia and the Holy See, for the accrediting of a Papal Nuncio at Berlin, and the extension of the influence of the Catholic episcopacy in that kingdom. Hitherto no positive facts have corroborated such reports, however probable they may appear, considering the policy of King William to court the sympathies of German Catholics in order to obtain their support towards the establishment of a Prussian protectorate over all Germany. Since 1866 monastic institutions have been greatly on the increase in Prussia, two hundred old convents having been re-established and about one hundred and fifty new ones founded in about three years, so that the total number of religious houses in the North German kingdom is now seven hundred, occupied by upwards of seven thousand monks. Thirteen of these establishments belong to the Jesuits. The Court of Rome naturally rejoices in this development of Catholicism under the leading regime of Germany, and is partly consoled by it for the sad defection of constitutional Austria.

At the Banquet given at Halifax on the evening of the 20th, General Doyle, in his speech, said—"That he wished every man in Nova Scotia who did not desire to live under the British flag would leave Nova Scotia." Very good advice, but will the Annexationists take it. Hardly. They would rather remain at home, grumble and growl, and make things generally as unpleasant as possible, than take their departure just now for "the land of the free and the home of the brave." And the recent loyal manifestations in our sister Province will be anything but agreeable to their excited feelings. More power to the Haligonians, and long may they live to revere the dear old flag, under whose protecting folds we were born, and beneath which we hope to die.—*Chatham Adv.*

During a violent storm at Blesheim (Haut-Rhine) three days back two persons, Mr. Trouillet, a farmer, and an old woman, being overtaken by rain, sought shelter under a poplar, and were both killed by the lightning. The electric fluid struck Mr. Trouillet first on the forehead and passed out at the back of the neck, re-entered the body under the shoulder blade, and escaped through the chest, having perforated the heart. No marks were found on the other body.
