U.S. Official To Participate In Mt. A. Summer Institute

J. Robert Schaezel of the State Department, Washington, who with his wife and daughters are motoring to Sackville where he will take part Aug. 16 to 18 in Mount Allison 1962 Summer Institute on "Canada, the Commonwealth and the Common Market".

Formerly a special assistant to George Ball, the under secretary of State, Mr. Schaezel is now deputy assistant, secretary for Atlantic affairs, a new post created in March in response "to the great progress made in European unity and the rising importance of North Atlantic relations to the United States."

Mr. Schaezel was director of the "task force" which reported to President Kennedy on the organization of the European Community of the State Department when the present administration took office in 1961.

Mr. Schaezel was in Europe, with headquarters in Brussels, Belgium, carrying on studies of the European integration movement as a recipient of a Rockefeller Public Service Award.

From 1955 to 1959 he was head of the peaceful uses section in the office of the special assistant

to the Secretary of State for Atomic Energy and Outer Space.
A Californian, he was graduated from Pomona College in 1955 and did post-graduate studies at Harvard University 1950 to 1952.

Beef Committee To Meet Friday

The special beef producers committee will meet here Friday evening. It was convened yesterday from J.L. Dewar, committee secretary.

Chairman Daniel Goss, Cornwall, said a few days ago the committee will name a "check-off" price paid to Canadian packers under the "formula" negotiated with the firm by the beef producers committee. It will have a direct relation to the price paid at Winnipeg.

THREE TOP BRANDS
The formula buying will apply to the three top brands only (Red, Blue and Brown), which, Mr. Goss told a beef producers meeting here last week, accounts for only 30 per cent of the animals sold here for beef every day.

Also to be met here at the Friday meeting, it was learned from Mr. Goss, will be a five or six member committee to meet with Agriculture Minister Andrew MacIsaac, to ask for the appointment of a special beef friend who can advise farmers on their beef cattle requirements.

The Cornwall man added that his committee will continue to have under active consideration the problem of arranging for livestock marketing yards here, and will be in touch with Upper Canadian stock yards people. This was also authorized at last week's beef producers meeting here.

St. Andrews Point Is Found Untouched Historical Site

MONTAGUE — One of the few historical sites left untouched in the province, St. Andrews Point in Lower Montague, attracts many visitors each year and offers a view of the meeting of three rivers, Montague, Broadmead and Carleton, which merge to form Georgetown Harbor. It is situated on land now owned by Jack Clark who is a very congenial host to all who would wish to picnic or just drink in the view and rest.

Many of the graves of some of the first settlers can be found by visitors just to the right of the point, sheltered by a small wood.

Still legible are the names of John Altan, born in Auchinstry, Scotland, in 1729 who came to P.E.I. in 1778 and died in 1797; James Wightman, who at the age of 21 was an assistant surgeon in the American Army and was buried there in 1861. Two other stones bear the names of John Wightman, who died in 1832 and his wife Margaret, who died in 1863. These people were the ancestors of many of the present day inhabitants.

One headstone has the initials B.C. on it and many conjecture have been made as to what they might stand for.

At one time St. Andrews Point was a thriving settlement, complete with stores, including one run by the Wightmans. Many people travelled long distances to shop there for a new hat or yard of ribbons.

Paper Cutback Hits Loggers In Newfoundland

CORNER BROOK (CP)— Newfoundland loggers will lose about \$1,000,000 in wages this fall and winter because of a cutback in newspaper production by Bowaters Newfoundland Pulp and Paper Mills Limited, General Manager Albert Martin said Tuesday.

Mr. Martin said in an interview the annual amount of pulpwood cut by the loggers, usually about 600,000 cords, has been reduced to 50,000 cords this year.

The reduced pulp wood cut had been announced earlier along with a plan to put the mill on a five-day week starting Oct. 1.

This would cut its newspaper production by 1,850 tons a week, or one day's production, leaving the plant operating at about 87 per cent capacity.

Mr. Martin said Tuesday some of the slack in work for loggers may be taken up by the export pulpwood industry. There is a steady market for quality Newfoundland pulpwood in France and other European countries if the price is competitive. He felt as much as 150,000 cords a year could be exported by Bowaters if government permission is obtained.

Newfoundland law allows paper companies to export pulpwood on a ratio to the amount of pulpwood they use. At Bowater's present rate of production this is about 120,000 cords annually, but the cutback would reduce this.
