"That is just what happened when I grew a beard," the duke said jokingly to the boy. "One side went up and the other side went down. In the end I had to shave it off." Before the duke revealed this "secret," Britons had believed that the Queen, then Princess Elizabeth, saw him with his moustache and beard during a leave and ordered him to shave it off.

GM Stock Split Recommended

NEW YORK (AP)—A three-for-one stock split was recommended

Tuesday by the directors of the General Motors Corporation to be voted on at a special stockholders' meeting Sept. 23.

The stock of the world's largest manufacturing concern has been rising steadily. Tuesday it climbed

\$3.75 a share on the New York stock exchange, closing at its record high of \$113.37.

The rise took place before the announcement of the stock split. GM at present has nearly 93,000,000 shares of common stock

outstanding, more than any other corporation. The biggest holder by far of GM stock is E.I. du Pont de Nemours and Company which has 21,000,000 shares.

GM's last stock split occurred Oct. 2, 1950.
