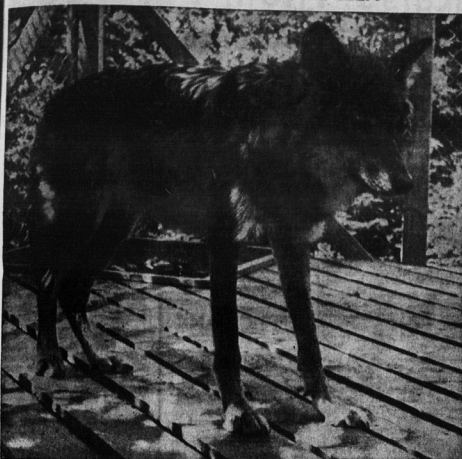
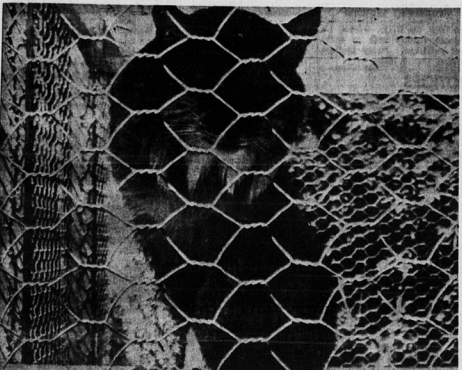


MANY WILD ANIMALS TO BE SEEN

Wildlife Park At N. Rustico Will Open On Thursday

A wild life park that opens officially at North Rustico Thursday afternoon has attractions for all, but several of them are sure to prove a smash hit with the children.

Minnie the moose is a seven weeks old, is attractive and appealing in her quiescent friendliness that encompasses just about everyone who stops to admire her. The baby moose drinks from a bottle—she gets 25 ounces of milk three times daily—but she is also nibbling grass in her part of the wild life paddock in the colorful park land.

The other two "musts" are the White Tail deer that are only four weeks old. Their spots will disappear as they mature, but they contribute now to an appearance of dainty loveliness that is difficult to describe.

The deer have not been named yet. That's a job for Janie Bartlett, six-year-old daughter of Charles O. Bartlett, president and general manager, and Mrs. Bartlett. It was Janie who named the baby moose and she's going to name these beautiful fox.

"We want to have a representation of all the animals that are native to the Atlantic Provinces," Mr. Bartlett said yesterday.

Two bear cubs are coming from Newfoundland and two yearling bears from the provincial government game farm at Magnet Hill, near Moncton, N.B.

LAYOUT IS IDEAL.

Mr. Bartlett, who gave up a good position with the federal live wild life service to come here, is delighted with the layout. Asked why he chose this spot—it runs from the North Rustico Road to the Gulf Shore Drive in the National Park—he said "If I could order a wild life park made to specifications, I couldn't possibly hope for anything better."

This place observed Mr. Bartlett, has just the right combination of rolling cleared land and woods, with a beautiful stream in the valley to accommodate the various species of wild geese and ducks and other birds that will be seen. There are also seals otters and beavers among the water animals.

Forty acres of the park are completely enclosed with an eight-foot fence with an overhanging for additional retentive qualities. The greatest care is taken to make the animals secure in their own pens or cages, but the completely enclosed property provides a further safety measure, should any of them escape from their own quarters, it was explained.

There are racoons, a timber wolf, a lynx, a skunk, red foxes—Mr. Bartlett wants to get silver foxes and the patch or cross bred fox, to have a representation of the animals that made this province a millionaire's dream for many in the earlier part of this century. Caribou are coming and many others.

WOODLAND TRAIL.

The park is laid out so visitors can see most of the animals along a circuitous woodland trail that in itself is a dream journey for people accustomed to the confined life of a town or city.

There will be parking space for 800 automobiles and canteen facilities with just about every kind of refreshment, and material for a light lunch. In addition picnic tables are provided on the upper slope of the gently rolling land, where a quiet meal can be eaten in peace and solitude.

The entrance is at the North Rustico approach to the National Park and the one-way road leads to the exit on the North Rustico road.

This is the only private commercial park in the Maritime provinces and, apparently, one of the few in Canada. In addition to the 40 acres fenced for present use, there are 47 acres available for future development if extra land is needed.

The park will be open each day from eight in the morning until the same hour in the evening after it is officially opened tomorrow in a ceremony which will include Lieutenant Governor F.W. Hyndman and Premier Walter Shaw among the special speakers.

Though there are admission charges for everyone during the tourist season, supervised school groups and other young peoples groups such as Scouts, Guides, etc., will be taken through free of charge, and given every opportunity to make those visits as educational as possible. In fact the educational opportunities of the wildlife park appeal strongly to the man who is a charge of the undertaking.
