Tax Decision Affects Seamen

OTTAWA (CP)—A decision affecting seamen in many Canadian ports was handed down Wednesday by the income tax appeal board.

The board dismissed the appeal of Robert Williams of Horseshoe Bay, B.C., a marine engineer officer.

Williams received \$228 in 1952 for board and accommodation aboard his vessel but omitted the sum as part of his net income. The revenue department added the \$228, bringing Williams' taxable income to \$4,305.

Williams claimed that under the Canada Shipping Act the owner of a ship is obliged to furnish the crew with provisions and accommodation, that he had no choice but to accept them and that the \$228 should not be regarded as part of his earned income.

In dismissing this appeal, board member R. S. W. Fordham said in a written judgement: "Williams' main contention impressed me as being novel, but untenable."

Nowlan Mad At P. O. Special Delivery Dept.

OTTAWA (CP)—George Nowlan (P.C. Digby—Annapolis—Kings) is mad at the post office department's special delivery branch.

He said in the Commons Thursday it cost him \$20 in long distance telephone calls to Montreal to find out there is something "radically wrong" in the system. The public could get better service by ordinary mail service than by special delivery.

Mr. Nowlan's troubles started May 27 when he posted passports from the Commons post office to a friend in Montreal by registered special delivery mail.

FRANTIC TELEPHONE CALLS The friend, who is sailing for Britain June 2, still had not received the passports the day of his scheduled departure.

After frantic telephone calls and the help of an investigator of the department, the letter was found in the Notre-Dame-De-Grace post office, waiting to be picked up by Mr. Nowlan's friend.

Mr. Nowlan said he was told by the investigator that the letter could not be delivered that day, but that he could give special instructions. He said his friend, whom he did not identify, picked up the letter himself.

DISPUTED EXPLANATION He disputed the explanation supplied by Postmaster-General Cote who said two calls were made without an answer to the doorbell.

After the second attempt, a notice was left by the carrier, advising the addressee he should pick up the letter at a postal station.

Mr. Nowlan said he has been told there was someone at his friend's house at all times and that the postman never called or left a notice.

He said he realized Mr. Cote is not responsible, but the public who pays something extra for special delivery service should get it.

OTTAWA (CP)—Labor department officials are investigating the possibility of bringing commercial fishermen and farmer within the scope of the unemployment insurance commission.

However, labor Minister Gregg said Thursday night he could not say whether they will become eligible until the report is received and studied by the government.
