SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP)—A Costa Rican town on a direct invasion route to this capital city has been seized by an airborne armed force, officials said Tuesday.

Origin of the war was not established, but the foreign ministry said a break in relations between Costa Rica and neighboring Nicaragua appeared imminent.

The Costa Rican government said a small rebel aerial force—presumably from Nicaragua—seized the town. Another source said a force moved out of San Jose Monday night in trucks and cars and began an uprising against the government of President Jose Figueres.
