Montague RHS Notes 25 Per Cent Increase

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GRADIENT
Classes have enrolled at Montague Regional High School with 775 students enrolled in the four high school grades. This represents an increase of 100 students or 25 per cent above that of last year.

With the addition of nine highly qualified and experienced teachers to the staff, it is felt that in spite of the increased enrollment high academic standards will be maintained.

The high school staff now numbers 33 teachers. New teachers joining the staff this year are Willard McCarron, BA; Mervin Melnis, BA, B. Ed.; Vance Griffin, BA; William Faulkner, B. Sc.; Mrs. Frank MacMillan, BA; Mrs. Annie Gillis; Dorothy Parker; Douglas Leitch, BA; Mrs. Grace Robertson and Pauline MacDonald, BA.

In view of the ever increasing academic load physical education classes are conducted outside school hours, during noon recess for bus students and after class sessions for local students. These classes are under the direction of Donnie LeClair, BA, who has had special training in this field. Mr. LeClair will also do some regular academic teaching in the science department.

With an ever increasing number of students entering the commerce courses and in consequence of departmental regulations establishing a one and two year course for grade 11 and grade 10 students respectively, it was found necessary to procure the services of a third commerce teacher.

In view of the above statistics it was stated by school officials that it becomes apparent that a trade courses must be made available to students in this area as it is not to be expected that all qualify for the rigid academic program now offered.

At the Montague Elementary School, a slight increase over last year of 340 students from 337 was shown on opening day.

Higher Wage Rate Sought

C. R. McQuaid chairman of the provincial labor relations board revealed yesterday that the skilled and unskilled employees from three or four Island firms have applied to be exempt as teacher her class of retarded children at the elementary school.

At present the minimum wage in P.E.I. is 90 cents, with an increase to 95 cents in November, and finally to \$1 in May. Mr. McQuaid said that study of the matter by the board may result in minimum wage regulation being presented for government approval for the group in question.

The government is expected to give approval shortly for a minimum wage order for women in certain types of firms in Charlottetown and Summerside, which was recently drafted by the board.

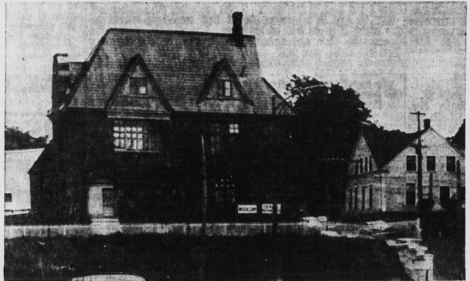

Five Month Jail Term Given For Break, Theft

GEORGETOWN—Donald Jerome O'Brien of Cardigan was sentenced to five months in Kings County Jail when he appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, C.J. in Kings County magistrate's court at Georgetown, yesterday.

O'Brien elected summary trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering and the theft of approximately \$20 and two cans of tomatoes from Ray's Groceria in Georgetown.

The accused, who was counselled by John P. Nicholson, had two previous convictions of theft. Also counselled by Mr. Nicholson, Alfred Roland Moore, 27, was convicted on two counts of driving while his operator's licence was suspended and on each charge a fine of \$50 and costs was imposed.

In the first case Const. Arnold H. Beaudin and Miles E. Foster, RCMP, testified for the prosecution, while Const. Reginald B. Lutz testified in the second case.

Charged with doing damage to a neon sign to the amount of \$73, William Burke, Georgetown, elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty. The accused was not represented by counsel and he was given an adjournment until Sept. 18 for sentence.

Two Brudenell residents, Spenser Brown Shaw and Civi Bernice MacDonald, both pleaded guilty to the theft of an automobile tire and rim, the property of Rev. Basil Lowery, Montague. Both cases were adjourned until Sept. 11 when sentence will be handed down.

The case of Harry Butler, Peterborough, was adjourned until Sept. 18, in order to permit the accused time to engage counsel. Butler is charged with failing to remain at the scene of an accident.

Benjamin D. MacEchtern, Hopefield, pleaded guilty to having possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased from a vendor's store and was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.

Two parties charged with the possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their respective residences were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. One resident of Georgetown facing two counts of being intoxicated in a public place, was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days on the first count and \$20 and costs or 30 days on the second.

In all cases the prosecution was conducted by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGilgan.
