

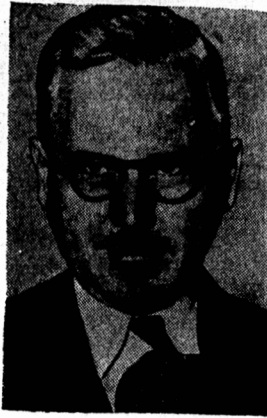
On Trial For Her Life

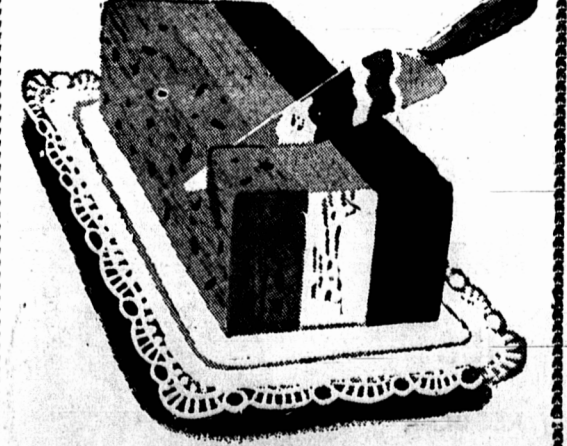
