U. S. SCIENTIST VISITING S'SIDE COMMENTS ON WAR, ATOMIC POWER

—"I believe it would be disastrous for Russia to start an atomic war, as the United States has high stockpiles of atom and hydrogen bombs," said Dr. C. W. Van Der Merwe, professor of physics at New York University, who with Mrs. Van Der Merwe has been spending the past three weeks at the Harbor View Cabins at Summerside East.

Dr. Van Der Merwe said he agrees with a statement made by Britain's Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill who said that the last safeguard for peace is the fact that the United States possess a large supply of atomic and hydrogen bombs and Dr. Van Der Merwe expressed the belief that if there should be another war, in all likelihood, the United States would be the first to use the atom bomb.

In regard to industrial use of atomic power, the doctor stated that at the moment the Atomic Energy Commission has full control over atomic power in the United States but that legislation has been endorsed by President Eisenhower giving private industry a share in the development of atomic energy and that this legislation would probably be passed in the near future.

Dr. Van Der Merwe also stated that a trip to the moon is not so fantastic as many people think and although there are a lot of difficulties to overcome, he felt that the accomplishment of such a tremendous feat might be quite near at hand.

Dr. Van Der Merwe is chairman of the physics department of Washington Square College, one of the colleges making up the University of New York which had an enrollment of 65,000 students four years ago. He has been instructor and professor of physics since 1925 and will be superannuated next year after 30 years of faithful service to the university. During the last year he went to Washington, D.C., where he was a member of a group of scientists that assisted in the development of the proximity fuse.

He has a Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Stellenbosch, located near Capetown, South Africa, a Master's Degree from the University of Edinburgh, Scotland, and a Ph.D. from the University of Göttingen, Germany.
