Pair Remanded In Breaking And Entering Case

Two city men were remanded to April 18 yesterday morning when they appeared before Magistrate K. M. Martin in City Police Court charged with break/enter and theft.

The two are charged with breaking into the warehouse of Keith MacKinnon and stealing a truck and quantity of goods valued at \$300. Warrants for their arrests were issued and circulated throughout the Maritimes.

The pair were apprehended in Moncton and returned by city police officials to Charlottetown yesterday.

The truck was recovered the day after the robbery in Borden.

Two Mr. Stewart men also appeared in court. One man was fined \$5 and costs or two days when he pleaded guilty to being drunk and incapable while a 34-year old native of that community pleaded guilty to an impaired driving charge and was fined \$100 and costs or 20 days.

A Hunter River man was fined \$5 and costs or two days when he pleaded guilty to a charge of being drunk and incapable.

Cases Heard By Magistrate

The preliminary hearing of a Monticello resident, charged with illegal possession of liquor was further adjourned yesterday in County Magistrate's Court when Crown Prosecutor J. P. Nicholson asked the court for time to gather rebuttal evidence.

The accused pleaded not guilty to the charge at an earlier hearing. The case was adjourned until April 18.

A city man one-of-nine originally involved in the theft and possession of a number of cases of butter, land and shoring, had his preliminary hearing further adjourned on the advice of his counsel R. R. Bell, Q.C.

A Kinross man and a resident of West Royalty were meted fines of \$5 and costs each or five days when they appeared before Magistrate Gilbert E. Gaudet. The former pleaded guilty to operating a mechanically unit vehicle on the highway and the West Royalty man failed to register his vehicle properly with the Motor Vehicle Branch.

A \$10 fine plus costs or 10 days was handed down to a Victoria cross man when he pleaded guilty to exceeding the speed limit. A Winsloe youth, charged with leaving his car unattended on the highways was fined \$2 and costs or two days.

A Hazelbrook youth charged with failing to transfer the registration of his vehicle, had his case withdrawn when the court was told the circumstances of the case.

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Future Work

Speaking of the 1958 program on rural electrification, the Premier said first preference would be given to the First and Second districts of Prince where it is expected the greater part of that area will receive power.

The Premier explained that four to a mile was the minimum set for extending lines at the present time but assured the Opposition members that the present applications were cleared up they would be settled roads maybe three to five miles or more sparsely a mile or even two to a mile.

RUSH IN CLOSING

Referring briefly to the criticism offered regarding the rushing of business through the House, the Premier said it didn't make the least bit of difference to him when the House would close, he lived in the city.

He said he was "greatly disturbed" over the headlines which appeared in the evening press. He claimed the headline had no relation to the article which it covered and affirmed, "the only place you would see that kind of headline would be in 'Hush' or 'Flash'."

The Premier said the bill referred to in the newspaper article would not have passed in any case, regardless of how much time the House had to deal with it. He said too many opposed it.
