Entire Province Area May Be Designated

OTTAWA (CP special) - John Mullally, MP for Kings, has predicted all of Prince Edward Island will likely be designated under the new criteria for industrial development announced in the Commons Monday.

"The Island certainly qualifies under three of the four new criteria that were announced," Mr. Mullally said.

In making the announcement Mr. Pearson said the new program would be available "in almost all of the Atlantic provinces."

Mr. Mullally, who has been pressing the government for changes in the legislation for some time, expressed approval of Mr. Pearson's announcement.

"P.E.I. has a number of very good, small, family-operated businesses which have never received any government aid," he commented. "Under the old program they were concerned that new industries could move into competition with them through government aid. Now, the present industries will be on the same footing as anyone else if they wish to add to their buildings, machinery or equipment."

Mr. Mullally added that the outright grant to industry was better than the tax incentives previously offered because many smaller industries were not likely to make any profits for the first few years and would therefore derive no benefit from the tax relief.

Andre Durocher Pleads Guilty

MONTREAL (CP) - Andre Durocher, 28, who rode to fame when he scaled the wall of Montreal's Bordeaux jail with narcotics suspect Lucien Rivard, pleaded guilty Tuesday to a charge of escaping legal custody.

Sentence was postponed until June 11.

Durocher, sporting dyed red hair, was recaptured Friday night by police in a north-end apartment.

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2 Astronauts Enjoy Long Sleep On Wasp

ABOARD THE WASP (AP) - Astronauts James McDivitt and Edward White roamed aboard the Wasp Tuesday—their strong hearts showing little ill effect from their four-day weightless marathon in space.

Tired after their mostly fitful and sporadic dozing in space, the astronauts slept late Tuesday—while a marvelling world of Americans watched on television White's filmed "stroll" in space.

Doctors continued the routine of medical checks on the two men—and gave them the run of the ship to stretch their legs after being cramped in the tight spacecraft quarters nearly 98 hours.

The astronauts went to bed at midnight Monday night—and didn't rise until 10:30 a.m. Tuesday. Then they put away a breakfast of apple juice, scrambled eggs, sausage and milk. McDivitt topped it off with coffee, White with tea.

DRANK LITTLE WATER During the mission the astronauts did not take as much water as they were supposed to, and their food intake was 700-800 calories below the planned menu of 2,500 calories a day.

"This was nothing of real concern—but less than we anticipated," Berry said. "We talked to them (during the flight) about water and sleep. They did increase their water intake."

Sleep patterns varied greatly—as telemetered reports to the ground showed. He added:

Flight cabin temperatures stayed comfortably low—and even during parachute descent, when it usually goes up, it held at some 70 degrees.

"The system functioned well and put the astronauts in much better shape to do the work of preparing for re-entry than otherwise would have been possible," Berry said.
