### NEWS NOTES.

The London Lancet, referring to the recent injury of the Prince of Wales' knee, discourages the fear that the Prince will be permanently lame.

Several American warships will return to Hong Kong and dock when Great Britain shall have recognized the peace between the two countries.

The amount of money which is to be spent upon the British navy is just about twice as much as that which is to be spent upon the navy of any other nation. France intends spending close upon £12,000,000; Japan, £6,400,000; Germany, £4,400,000; and Italy, £4,000,000.

At a recent sale of hackney and harness horses held in England, out of seventy-five horses, fifty-seven changed hands and several were afterwards sold at private sale. A chestnut cob, 14 hands 2 inches high, brought £2 guineas and a chestnut gelding, 15 hands 3 inches high, brought 60 guineas. There was a large attendance of buyers, and trade for harness horses and cobs was exceedingly brisk.

Sir Herbert Kitchener's advance on Khartoum has begun and is conducted like clock work. The Khalifa has withdrawn from his entrenchments at the Shabulka cataract, but the War Office is confident that he will fight. The Omdurman country is rising behind him and he dare not now retreat. When Sir Herbert Kitchener will strike his final blow nobody will know until it falls. That is Kitchener's way, as witness the blow he struck and the victory he won at the Atbara last Good Friday.

The firm of Eder, Dempster and Co., have just added a 11,000 ton steamer to their Canadian fleet, a fact which emphasizes the increasing keenness of competition for that trade and the importance attached here to future developments. The Messrs. Allan are quite alive to the dangers ahead, and have on the stocks new steamers to the value of nearly \$4,000,000. The Allan people are promising a seven days' passage to Canada. They are hopeful to get the mail contracts next year.

The Manchester Ship Canal, on the last half year's working, succeeded in paying interest to the first and second mortgage debenture holders, but not to the Manchester City Council, which has now an accumulated debt of \$3,500,000 for interest alone. Still, the outlook for the undertaking is very much more promising than ever. The net revenue of the half year amounted to \$100,000, as against a loss of \$4,500 on the first half of 1887. The toll-paying merchandise increased from 957,210 to 1,173,880 tons; sea-borne traffic showed an increase of 196,712 tons; coal of 90,000, grain imports of 21,400 tons. The tank oil trade has made a good beginning, over 20,000 tons having been imported during the half year. Altogether it looks as if the long lane of deficits and difficulties was at last near the turning.

PETITCODIAC, Aug. 24.—Numerous reports come in from the surrounding country that the wheat and oats are rusting, due to the continued wet weather, followed by sultry days. In some places the oats are literally rotten.

### PROGRAMME FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA.

#### Sir Hibbert will Take a Hand.

VANCOUVER, B. C., August 24.—Another Provincial election is imminent. When the House meets the majority will be in opposition and the Government course will be an appeal to the people. Ex-Premier Turner will not be restored, say his former organs. This would mean a confession of fault on the part of the Lieut. Governor. The line taken by the independent press is that after the dissolution, Liberals and Conservatives will call conventions. In fact the Conservatives are already asked to meet on September 1st and 2nd. Then there will be an appeal to the country on party lines. Mr. Turner will cut loose from Liberal friends and followers and Mr. Turner or Sir Hibbert Tupper will attempt to carry the country for the Conservatives, while "Joe" Martin will be the standard-bearer for the Liberals.

Eight tenders in all were received, three for a part only of the whole amount advertised, namely: From John Ings and E. H. Haviland, Charlottetown, and Halifax Fire Insurance Company, Halifax. The Bank of British North America, Halifax, and the Standard Life Insurance Company Edinburgh, per their Agent, Mr. F. W. Hyndman, tendered for the whole sum, but they were not close bids. The following three tenders, from Debenture brokers, one each from three of the principal money centres of the Dominion may be taken as a fair index of the present value of debentures of cities such as Charlottetown. W. H. Brouse, Toronto, 94.60, \$47,300; Hanson Bros, Montreal, 95.01, \$47,505; J. C. MacKintosh, Halifax, 95.27, \$47,635. The tender of Mr. MacIntosh for the round lot was accepted.

WATER SUPPLY.—With reference to the letter which appeared in yesterday's EXAMINER, we are informed that sufficient water is run off each day to maintain a proper circulation in all the water pipes in the city. In the lower part of the town, along Water street, the heaviest draughts are made for the railway and steamers, consequently there is very little danger of the water becoming dead. The daily consumption is between five and six hundred thousand gallons, pumped fresh every day into the reservoir. There are about three miles of water mains.
